"Up in Walton Hills" albums depict the lives of the people who lived in this community from 1936 until the present year.

How the "Up in Walton Hills" albums were saved and acquired by the Walton Hills Historical Resource Center:

Weekly columns titled "Up in Walton Hills with Country Jane" appeared in the *Bedford Times-Register* from 1949 until 1963. These articles were written by Bedford Township residents living in the 'Walton Hills' section of the township: **Florence Wagner**, **Ruth Marquardt**, **Helen Laing** and **Georgia Pace**, all of whom wrote under the byline 'Country Jane.'

Florence Wagner wrote the weekly columns from 1949 until 1955. Armin and Florence Wagner lived at 7450 McLellan Drive. From 1955 until 1958 Ruth Marquardt of Alexander Road wrote the columns. In 1959 Helen Laing wrote the articles. Jack and Helen Laing lived at 160 Walton Road. Lastly, Georgia Pace wrote the columns from 1960 to 1963. Georgia and Ben Pace's home is at 17836 South Meadowpark Drive.

Ludwig Shaner Conelly, owner of The Conelly Realty Co., collected the "Up in Walton Hills with Country Jane" articles, plus other articles, fliers and photos of this part of Bedford Township. General Conelly gave his collection to Betty Walton of Walton Road. Betty Walton continued to collect articles and then in 1980 turned everything over to Joe Mazzone of Carmany Drive. In 1985 Virginia Mazzone gave the scrapbook material to Jean and Bob Kainsinger of Orchard Hill Drive.

In 1999 the Kainsingers assembled the collection of data into albums labeled "Up in Walton Hills." The albums include additional newspaper articles and photos collected by many other local residents. The albums are chuck-full of an assortment of material of local interest.

Origins of the Walton Hills Historical Resource Center

- Beginning in the 1930s, L. S. Conelly, a local Realtor-Developer, started a collection of articles, fliers and photos that related to the "Walton Hills" part of Bedford Township.
- 2. Years later L. S. Conelly gave the materials to Betty Walton of Walton Road.

 Betty Walton put the papers in a scrapbook, and continued collecting material.
- 3. In 1980 Betty Walton turned everything over to Joe Mazzone of Carmany Drive.
- 4. In 1985 Virginia Mazzone, Joe Mazzone's widow, gave the scrapbook to Jean and Bob Kainsinger of 18955 Orchard Hill Drive.
- 5. The "Up in Walton Hills with Country Jane" Articles:

From 1949 through 1963 there was a weekly column in the *Bedford Times Register* called "Up in Walton Hills with Country Jane."

The articles were written by 4 Walton Hills women, all under the byline "Country Jane."

They were Florence (Armin) Wagner of 7450 McLellan Drive, Ruth Marquardt of Alexander Road,
Helen (Jack) Laing of 160 Walton Road and Georgia (Ben) Pace of 17836 South Meadowpark Drive.

Their years of writing the articles: Florence Wagner 1949-1955 Ruth Marquardt 1955-1958
Helen Laing 1959 Georgia Pace 1960-1963

- 6. The current Village Hall Community Room, which was completed in 1972, has shallow hand-crafted show cases and deep hand-crafted cabinets. For the first 16 years, the show cases were empty and the cabinets held a few trophies.
- 7. When Bob Kainsinger was in Council, the 12 years from 1988 through 1999, he asked Jean to decorate and fill-up the Community Room show cases and cabinets with items of local interest.
- 8. The Kainsingers transferred the scrapbook material into acid-free pages, assembled them into "Up in Walton Hills" albums, and put them in the Community Room cabinets.

The albums include additional newspaper articles and photos that were contributed by several residents.

- 9. In 1999 the Kainsingers officially turned over the collection of material to the village.
- 10. With approval from the Village, the Walton Hills Historical Resource Center became a reality.
- 11. Volunteers Jean Kainsinger and Ruth Money of 7075 Walton Road volunteered to co-chair the Walton Hills Historical Resource Center and through their joint efforts during the past years, the Walton Hills Historical Resource Center has grown from 4 albums to over-flow.


A Friendly Community



Hub Of Activity In Walton Hills Is Its Multi-Purpose Village Hall

The life of Walton Hills flows through it's heart, the busy municipal building at Alexander and Walton Roads.

Beside housing all government offices, the place is a beehive of activity, serving as the meeting place for many organizations in the fast growing community.

The basement meeting room doubles in for meetings of the Men's Club, Estates Club, Brownies, Rangers, Women's Club, cub and explorer scouts and for a nursery school three days a week.

As many as 25 small fry have been enrolled in the school, where teaching is done by accredited teachers as part of the Cuyahoga County Cooperative Nursery Ass'n. At present, 18 children attend ses-

sions held each Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Mrs. Theodore Hack is in charge.

In this predominately residential community, emphasis is on planning for recreational facilities for the young people. This interest culminated in the council chambers recently, when far-sighted legislators authorized purchase of 16 acres of land for that use.

Located immediately west of the industrial area fronting on Northfield Road, the park will serve as a buffer against residential property in the Dellwood Drive area.

Development is to be projected over a five to 10 year period. Presently, a site planning consultant is working on plans for development and two baseball diamonds are already in.

In this same building, solons also appropriated \$10,000 for the 1961 recreation program. They will continue yearly to finance the project until the park is completed.

The community's recreational activities now are carried out on property owned by the Estates Club, where a small lake adds to youngsters' enjoyment.

Land is leased to the village at a token fee, and recreation directors are employed by the village.

Village Clerk Merlin Bement disclaims any immediate plans for expanding the bustling town hall. Officials who use it are content to put up with relatively cramped quarters while making decisions that will open up new vistas for enjoyment in other parts of their community.

Chamber of Commerce

Raymond C. Hendershot, staff executive of the Cleveland Chamber of Commerce, spoke at the last meeting of the Walton Hills Chamber of Commerce.

The following are a few of his remarks: What is a Chamber of Commerce? Basicly: it is the business community at work as the central agency for community development for business, industry, the professions, and all civic interests - doing jobs that no individual can do alone - rendering many services that benefit all citizens. The Chamber of Commerce as a wholly voluntary institution in the United States is eight years older than the Declaration of Independence.

How is it organized? The members according to the by-laws provisions, elect a board of directors whose members serve without pay. They determine policies and the general course and operation of the Chamber. Necessary committees are set up from the general membership under supervision of the board.

What does it do? The Chamber of Commerce works to improve business and build a better community. It makes available to all members of the business community - firms and individuals alike—the necessary vehicle through which to combine forces for executing the continuous, year-after-year program of work necessary for community development.

How does it work? The Chamber of Commerce works through committees which analyze problems, develop solutions, and take action to achieve the objectives which solve the problems.

Office service for the Chamber of Commerce maintains a working library of directories, reports, surveys, maps, travel information and other material available for the inspection and use of its members.

Detailed civic information is given out by means of telephone calls and correspondence to residents, newcomers, visitors and persons making inquiry.

How is it financed? All chambers are supported primarily by the members of the business community (representing business, industry or the professions) who are interested in stimulating new and improved business and building a better community.

Who can and should belong? All businesses, industries and professional men are not only eligible to be Chamber members, but should be.

Election Thoughts

Despite the fact that this is an off year, the coming election is of utmost importance, to the residents of Walton Hills. There are two kinds of officials: those elected by the people and those appointed by the mayor with approval of council.

The mayor, clerk of courts, treasurer and six councilmen are elected by the people.

A village is a municipal corporation and a complicated business. Among other things, council has the power to levy taxes and assessments, control fire and police protection, control building restrictions, manage and control finances. The village depends on the legislative authority of council under the leadership of the mayor.

You can realize how important it is to elect experienced and competent officials, as they are in effect the directors of a corporation.

What qualifications are desirable in the elected official?

He should have demonstrated constructive interest in public office twelve months a year, and not only at election time. He should have paramount interest in community welfare and what is best for all the people. He should have the ability to distinguish between big issues and minor details. He should use good judgement and make sound, objective decisions. He should study both sides of a question, determine all the facts.

Watch out for candidates with

personal grudges against city officials. Be wary of candidates who use the publicity as an advertising medium for personal gain.

There are three questions to ask a candidate: "Why are you running?" "What is your past record?" "What are your qualifications?"

If you apply these questions to all the candidates, you are bound to vote for the right men. If the wrong candidates get into office, the citizens who didn't vote or take the time to study the qualifications and the facts will have no one to blame but himself.

Walton Hills Charities Drive Nets \$2,977.20

Chamber of Commerce

The October meeting of the Walton Hills Chamber of Commerce opened by vice-president Lloyd Detwiler in the absence of president Ed Riley.

The question of public transportation in Walton Hills was reviewed. Victor Hindelang of Ford Motor Company stated that approximately 360 persons would probably avail themselves of this convenience:

He pointed out that a bus line running from Forbes Road to Ford Motor Company on Northfield Road in Walton Hills would take off the excess parking of 3,200 people at present it takes approximately 25 minutes to leave the Ford Plant parking lot.

Bus service would eliminate congestion at the Ford Motor Plant. It would also provide transportation for secretaries and the men who work in the plants on Krick Road in the Industrial Park. Children who attend schools and churches that do not provide transportation or after-school buses for outside activities could use the same buses.

It was suggested that this number of rides might not support a system properly. It was also suggested that if the industries would subsidize a shuttle line it might work out. A proposal was made to present the problem to the Geauga Line for consideration.







At the last Chamber of Commerce meeting, Robert Van Nice of the Cuyahoga County Engineers office was guest speaker. Following are the highlights of his speech on a matter of importance to all of us in Walton Hills.

Alexander Road to Dunham Road is basically good pavement but needs a salvage job costing \$300,000 to widen and resurface it, and Dunham to Northfield will cost \$650,000 This cost is eligible for 50 per cent Federal aid and the remaining 50 per cent would come from the county.

How does the county get their 50 per cent? It would spread the work over three, four and five year and skip sections. Local municipalities would participate in construction, with assessments against property owners for Alexander Road.

Maximum cost to municipality is 50 per cent for two lane project. Four lane highway will cost the municipality 25 per cent, providing the traffic is there. Municipalities that come up with the money will get priority.

Following the meeting, Saunders and Howard Traffis, Purchasing Department Buyer from the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company, spoke on the Illuminating Company coal pipeline. This unique installation is designed to supply the greater portion of the coal consumed at Eastlake.

It runs 108 miles from Pittsburgh Consolidation Coal Company mines near Cadiz, Ohio, across country to Eastlake. Coal is piped as "slurry, a mixture of equal quantities of coal and water.

The 11 inch pipe is buried below the frost line. Its capacity is one and-a-quarter-million tons of coal a year with pressure maintained by three pumping stations along the route.

A separation plant at Eastlake is designed to break down the "slurry" into its components,—the coal to be dried for burning in the plant furnaces; the water, purified to a high degree, to be discharged into Lake Erie.

Tragedy Averted

Serious damage to the kitchen in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Sarnecki of Spanghurst Drive was averted last Sunday morning due to prompt action of volunteer fireman William Seiverth who put out the grease fire with the aid of a carbon dioxide fire-extinguisher belonging to neighbor Elmer Boege of Hicks Road.

Samecki attempted to call the Fire Department but could not, due to smoke. He notified his neighbor, Mrs. Elmer Boege, who promptly called the Bedford Fire Department and then roused her family.

They rushed to the aid of their neighbor. Elmer assisted in getting the children out, Carole carried out two of the children and Jim secured the extinguisher from their truck.

Fireman Seiverth of Meadow Park Drive, Walton Hills, who was on the scene in a matter of minutes, took the carbon dioxide extinguisher and put the fire out. The Bedford Fire Department arrived minutes later with a full complement of men and two pieces of equipment. Also on the scene was Patrolman George Furst.

Prompt action, proper procedure, and assistance of neighbors saved the day. Damage was restricted to the stove and possible smoke dam-

The value of first-aid, fire-fighting equipment cannot be overrated and each family should provide the proper units within their own homes.

We have become more aware of the problem of fire in Walton Hills since the recent explosion and fire at the John Alesci home on Alexander Road. The "most probable" cause of that disaster was a leak from an underground natural gas line. However, fire can start from many different sources.

With spring cleaning just around the corner, now is a good time to inspect your home and eliminate common fire hazards. In addition to removing the causes of fire, the homeowner should know what to do in case of fire.

The first rule is to call the fire department, BE 2-1212, when you

Thursday, March 22, 1962 smell smoke or see a fire. Do not A bit of jewelry you can spare will attempt to fight a fire until you have notified the fire department and given the firemen your exact address.

> This is the most important reason to have the correct house number on your mail box.

Have one or more good fire extinguishers around the house and know how to use them. Be sure your extinguisher is one that has been approved.

Fires are generally divided into three classes, and a knowledge of the type of fire will determine the type of extinguisher to sue. Class A fires are those involving wood. textiles, rubbish, etc. For this type of fire an extinguisher using sodaacid solution or foam is best.

Class B fires are those involving grease, gasoline, oil, and other flamable liquids. Dry chemical. carbon dioxide, and foam extinguishers are the best for this type of fire. Don't use water or soda-acid extinguishers; they may spread this type of fire.

For emergency in a small area, baking soda sprinkled on the fire will do the trick also. It is a good idea to keep a box of baking soda in the cupboard near the range.

Class C fires are those involving electrical machinery or wiring. Here again the dry chemical or carbon dioxide extinguisher is the best since it will not conduct electricity.

Nearly 85 percent of all home fires start in the kitchen, and it's a good idea to keep an extinguisher in or near this room. Kitchen fires usually involve grease or electricity; so an extinguisher approved for Class B and C fires is best.

Ordinance 1962-12 establishing the compensation to be paid the Inspector of Building pursuant to the building code ordinance of the village of Walton Hills and prescribing specific additional duties.

This ordinance calls for the remuneration of 50 percent of the permit fee on residential permits and 20 percent of the permit fee on industrial permits. In addition, the building inspector will receive \$2.50 per hour for work other than inspections on permit holders.

Ordinance 1962-13 increasing the yearly compensation of the Chief of Police, \$500, to a yearly salary







All of the recommended trees mature at heights between 16 and 35 feet and possess characteristics which will enhance the natural land-

Detailed information, such as the street, may be obtained at the Walton Hills Village Hall or from the Illuminating Company, which offers such tree plans as a community service to all Northeast Ohio municipalities.

Other communities in this area which are planting street trees according to plan are Bedford, Bedford Heights, Brecksville, Maple Heights, Oakwood, and Valley View.

(1) Place the tree in a metal tub so that roots can be kept well moistened (this is very important) but not water logged.

(2) If possible, keep the tree in an unheated room or garage for a few days before bringing it into the house - also before planting it in the yard. The idea being to reduce the shock of temperature change.

(3) Avoid putting ornaments or lights on the spike of the tree, as this may kill the leader and possibly deform the tree.

During World War I, he served as a major, was wounded twice, once in the Argonne Forest, France narrowly escaping death. He also received the Silver Star for outstanding performance beyond the call of duty.

At the war's end, he commanded the Ohio National Guard. In 1929, he was elevated to Brigadier General.

Back in the real estate business in 1932, he lost much of his real estate holdings as a result of the depression. Living in Bedford, the General's aggressiveness prompted him in developing the Walton Hills area in 1937.

World War II required his services as commander of the U.S. Troops in the Fiji Islands and New Zealand from 1940-1945.

At the war's end, he retired from active service and continued with his plans in developing Walton Hills. In 1952 he moved into his home on Conelly Boulevard. The following year Mrs. Conelly died. The General served as mayor of Walton Hills, and recently retired as administrator of Walton Hills Civil Defense.

Mayor Tom Young also related many interesting intimate details of their struggles together in starting the community. Mayor Young offered on behalf of himself and members, an honorary salute to the man who has contributed so much of his dedicated life to the

Richard DeChant, executive director of the Greater Cleveland Growth Board was guest speaker. A brief resume of his speech follows:

The Greater Cleveland Growth Board is a group of Northeastern Ohio businessmen with a common knowledge that the Greater Cleveland area was not growing with the rest of the nation. He pointed out that approximately 70 percent of Cleveland industry was being induced to leave the Cleveland area. Of this figure, one-half was seriously considering moving away from Cleveland, and about 43 percent indicated they were not favoring toward expanding in the Cleveland area.

The board was set up as a non-profit organization to provide more jobs in the Cleveland area by accomplishing two objectives: (1) keep "existing" industry in the Cleveland area because 85 percent of the jobs were provided by these industries and their growth. (2) entice "new" industry into the Cleveland area to make new jobs available.

Accomplishment of these objectives is being sought by: (1) com-

munication-changing the Greater Cleveland image, on a national basis, through a saturation program of advertising. (2) Mailing program - mail brochures and literature to company executives telling them about the advantages to be gained by locating in the Cleveland area. (3) direct selling - personal work directly with industry in selling Cleveland's advantages to them and induce industry to remain here.

The Greater Cleveland Board has accomplished much so far. A good promotion committee exists with a peaker's bureau which gives lectures about Cleveland's advantages and prospects for industry.

Eighty-eight new companies appeared in Cleveland in 1962 resulting in a 43 percent increase over 961. There has been a 39 percent increase of expenditures for expansion by existing industries in the Cleveland area.

Ohio is becoming competitive, with other states - the Ohio Development Authority Bill will provide financing through local development groups with aid from the State of Ohio.



By the time these things come to pass, I'm sure that all the studying on land use in the town by the Planning Commission will start paying dividends in some good spots for both motels and restaurants, plus some other commerce to keep pace of that tourist buck in BH.

This does pay off in various ways for the residents too. All of these facilities have to be manned, or womanned; and as things develop there will be more jobs for more people close to home.

Coming off the Pennsy Turnpike into Ohio, incidentally, I ran into a road survey which did an excellent job of slowing down traffic. They wanted to know where we had come from, where we were going, how long we had stayed, how much money we left in Pennsylvania and other comments.

My rather emphatic comment was that someone bught to check on the water content of the soft drinks sold in the various way stations along both turnpikes, since most everything in this line we paid for, tasted like faintly flavored water. Our young survey man said he would note this.


Especially needed is a chemist, chemical engineer or bacteriologist to be lake superintendent next year. Keeping the lake water in safe condition for swimming is one of the most important functions. Don Knowles, lake superintendent this year, has a B.A. in Chemistry from Upsala, and B. S. in Chemical Engineering from Newark College of Engineering.

Early in the season the club purchased some PH and chlorine testing equipment; twice a week water samples are also sent out for bacteria analysis. Don has done an excellent job in using the proper chemicals to maintain the lake.

Test results show the water to be as low as deep well drinking water in bacterial count. A daily log sheet, which can be inspected by any member, is kept.

There are many other jobs performed by the trustees which make use of wide variety of talents, and any member willing to spend some time and effort could be valuable as a club trustee. Therefore there is a request now for volunteers while there is time to get acquainted with some details while the current trustees are working.







GBERT BRIDGE DEATH TRAP



wide enough to accommodate one car safely, the bridge located in Bedford, Ohio on the north end of Egbert Road has been a subject of controversy for many years. The bridge has a sharp rise on each side which makes it almost impossible to see oncoming traffic. Thus autos meeting at the center of the bridge from opposite directions are in immediate danger of a collision.

The increase in Walton Hills population, construction of S. K. Wellman in Bedford and the Shawnee Golf Course have all contributed to the traffic burden that the bridge must carry. Yet, the antiquated bridge stands in itsoriginal shape and form.

The bridge was constructed in 1900 as a temporary crossover by the Pennsylvania Railroad. Since then, many attempts have been made to abolish the old bridge and construct one that would accommodate the traffic and eliminate the hazards. Unfortunately, the county, the City of Bedford and the railroad are unable to reach a mutual agreement.

The City of Bedford feels that the bridge is benefiting Walton Hills, The Metropolitan Park and the County more than it is Bedford. Thus the Bedford officials turned down a proposal whereby Bedford would absorb \$175,000 of the \$750,000 cost to replace the present structure with a new one.

In a Kiwanis Project undertaken two years ago, in which officials from Bedford, Walton Hills, Bedford School Board, Metropolitan Park and S. K. Wellman participated, all agreed unanimously that the bridge was a death trap and should be eliminated.

The County of Cuyahoga prepared plans for a new bridge. It was to be constructed just west of its present location on Metropolitan property. All curves in the immediate area of the bridge were to be eliminated. Total cost was approximately \$750,000.00.

The County and the Metropolitan Park were to take up the bulk of this tab, \$575,000, and Bedford \$175,000. However, Bedford offered to contribute \$42,000. The railroad was not to be taxed for the project. Walton Hills was asked to share in the project, but since the site is not within the village proper, no contribution could be made.

As the matter stands, the bridge is scheduled for replacement in the year of 1969.

FILE TODAY FOR WATER—TAP-IN PERMIT

Residents of Alexander, Egbert and North Meadowpark Roads have until February 1, 1965, to file their applications to tap into the new water mains.

Applications available at the Village Hall must be submitted in duplicate and a check to cover the application costs must accompany the application. Application fee for a 3/4 in. tap in is \$9.00, a 1 in. tap will cost the applicant \$16.00. Your check for the application fee should be made out to the order of "The Village of Walton Hills."

The cooperation of residents of Alexander, N. Meadowpark and Egbert is urgently requested in order to assist the Village to expedite installation in an efficient and economical manner. Residents who do not submit their application by Feb. 1st may be faced with paying for their own tap-in charges plus the expense of burrowing under the road if the resident resides on the opposite side of the street from the water line.

In order to obtain the most economical figure for the necessary tap-in, digging and burrowing, the excavation must be carried out in one continuous program and not broken down to one or two residents at a time.

The only requirement necessary to meet the Feb. 1st deadline is that an application be filed and accompanied by a check.

Costs for the water-meter may be sent in with your application if the applicant so desires. Payment for the water-meter must be made out to the order of "The City of Cleveland".

In the event one does not wish to pay for the water meter at the time he applies for the tap-in permit, then that person at a later date will have to go directly to the City of Cleveland and pay for the water meter. In other words, by paying for the water meter before Feb. 1, 1965, residents will save themselves the trouble of going directly to the City of Cleveland since our Village will handle the direct payment for you.

For Example:

- (1) "A" wanted to apply for the tap-in only and not for the water meter. "A" should send a check payable to the Village of Walton Hills along with his application in duplicate. At a later date the resident can call or go to the Cleveland Water Department and arrange for his own water meter payment.
- (2) "B" wanted to apply for the tap-in and also wanted to pay now for his water meter. "B" should send his application along with his check to cover the fee payable to the Village of Walton Hills. At the same time, the resident should send in a check payable to the City of Cleveland covering the cost of the Water meter of his choice. Bear in mind the cost of the water meter is dependent upon the size of the meter used.

If your house is located more than 300 feet from the street or if you are desirous of tapping in with a line larger than 3/4 in., call the village hall for specific instructions.

Village Clerk Merle Bement informed the Echo that to-date approximately 50 homes out of a potential 150 have filed their application for water service. Don't delay - Do it now. It may mean a savings between \$50 to \$125.

WALTON HILLS POLICE CAPTURE

ARMED ROBBERS

In true television "cops and robbers" style, the Walton Hills Police Department has participated in two armed robbery captures within a span of two weeks.

On December 9, 1964, at about 11:20 P. M., Officer Mardigan was on a routine patrol on Northfield Road. Suddenly he noted the gas station attendant running out towards his car. The attendant reported that he had been held up at knife-point by two men.

Robert Durst, the station attendant, reported \$207 in cash and a \$10 check was taken. The robbers had cut the telephone lines, thus crippling the attendant's communication with the police. Officer Mardigan along with Officer Keller were unable to locate the robbers.

Fifteen dayslater on December 19, 1964, at about 1:15 A. M., Patrolman Edward Bahensky and Fuerst were patrolling the village. A radio message was received by the officers reporting a robbery at the K-Way Service Station. Within minutes the patrol car was at the station. Bob Durst, the same attendant robbed on December 9th, reported that the same man had robbed him again with a butcher knife. Durst further stated that the man was on foot and was a negro.

The thief had taken a route behind the gas station towards Oakwood Village. Total loot taken was approximately \$45.00. Officer Bahensky started to follow the thief's route when he was joined by an Oakwood Policeman who had come upon the scene to assist. On North Street, Bahensky noted several footprints leading to a home. Bahensky suggested they check at the house.

Inquiry at the house bore fruit since one of the occupants furnished the police with a description of a 1957 Ford with one light missing in front and in back. A pick-up for the 1957 Ford was broadcasted over the police radio.

Fifteen minutes after the broadcast, the Twinsburg Police notified the Oakwood Department that they had the car and the occupants. The three officers along with the attendant went to Twinsburg for identification. Durst immediately pointed to one of the men as being the robber.

The suspects were taken into custody and taken to the Walton Hills Station. There a search disclosed that one of the men had money concealed in his shoes.

On Friday, December 4, 1964, Edward Bahensky assisted in the capture of two men who were suspected of robbing a Lawson Food Store in Oakwood. Intelligent police work on the part of the Oakwood police resulted in finding the suspects.





Some of the highlight's of accomplishments are as follows; village roads have been maintained, built up and paved, entirely out of street construction and general funds, without any special assessments. Roads constructed in newer allot-ments, have been built under vilsupervision, and more rigid specifications, and should be paved the near future.

Walton Hills has an excellent reputation for it's speedy snow re-moval, and ice control in winter months.

Excellent police and fire protection for Walton Hills is provided by a nine man police force, welltrained and equipped, and fire pro-

tection provided by contract with A well rounded, well staffed re-creation program has been provid-ed on village owned property, consisting of three baseball diamonds, the city of Bedford and Oakwood. two tennis courts, shelter building, and playground equipment, all of which has been accomplished dur ing my terms as Mayor.

This entire program has been financed out of general funds. No been special levies or Bond issues ne-

City of Cleveland water is now a reality in Walton Hills. It would take thousands of words to fully reveal the effort it has taken to bring city water to Walton Hills at a cost we can cope with, but this tremendous project is now nearing completion. I believe this is my greatest accomplishment as your mayor.

I believe my past record has shown that I have been able to cope with the problems at hand, and to carry out a program to effect solutions to problems, and to prevent some of the forseeable ones.

I feel two of the most important problems that face our village today are, the maintaining of our present zoning, and stream and air

pollution. I have always been adamently opposed to any reduction in our present zoning requirements, have been successful in preventing small sized lot development, and defending our right to maintain the type of community we set out to build.

Steps have been taken to correct existing pollution problems, some improvement is already in evidence. The problem of pollution, is usually man made, and world wide, and not easily solved. For this reason, it should not be avoided.

I pledge to continue to oppose reduction of lot sizes, and effect measures to correct and prevent pollution problems.

1. In the past several years our villagers have not been receiving tair representation from the present administration. During this time, as editor and founder of the W. Iton Hills Echo, village news-paper, I have been highly critical of our present administration be-cause of this factor. If elected, I shall rectify this condition.

5. I will give the people the benefit of new and constructive ideas with a foresight into our future needs; for example: In 1961, I re-commended a city water system without sewers. As a result, Walton Hills now enjoys fresh

water.
6. I intend to establish a small complaint committee composed of taxpayers who reside within our area. Any and all complaints registered by the citizens will be submitted to the committee to be acted upon and every complaint shall be answered in writing.

7. I propose to protect the rights of our village against governmental establishments which will become an eye sore to our residential area and which will reduce real estate evaluation.

8. I propose to protect our villager's rights in accordance with the zoning laws, against any expansions, industrial and otherwise, that will adversely affect residents living near or around that parti-cular area.

9. I shall keep the people fully in-

formed with truthful and complete periodic reports setting forth all important issues that directly ef-

fect the taxpayers.

10. I do not believe in a monopoly type of government. I promise to give the village of Walton Hills back to the people where it rightfully belongs.

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

A Home Hewn by Hand

Mr. and Mrs. Hank Dziczkowski have a good pole-ish story to tell. It's about their rustic house at 7135 Dunham Rd., Walton Hills. The house was built with utility poles.

"We got the idea many years ago when a utility pole in front of our house was struck by lightning. When the crew came to haul it away we asked them for it, and my husband built a fence," says Mrs. Dziczkowski. "It worked so well, we decided it might be a good way to build a house."

So six years ago they built a house. Actual construction, done entirely by the Dziczkowskis, their friends and relatives, took only ten months. But the preparation took much longer.

"I don't know how long we spent looking for poles. Every time we saw a crew replacing a pole we'd stop and ask them for the old one. I'm sure they thought we were crazy," laughs Mrs. Dziczkowski

DZICZKOWSKI SPENT TWO YEARS converting the round poles into square beams. He started by reading histories of American settlers and their techniques for building log cabins. Then he fashioned a tool like those used by the early

settlers for splitting the logs. After the beamswere finished, he split the stumps of the poles into shingles for the home's exterior.


Built log cabin-style, the home's outside walls are 10 to 12 inches thick (the "logs" themselves are seven inches thick). The reinforced 30-foot beams crossing the ceilings provide support and eliminate the need for interior bearing walls. ("We could move any of the partitions in the house," says Mrs. Dziczkowski.)

The stone fireplace wall in the living room was built of rocks that the children carried from the creek behind the house. The back of the wall, made of reclaimed brick, helps to create a foyer. Fireplace mantle was fashioned, of course, from a utility pole.

What inspires a mailman and his family to leave the city to become latter-day pioneers? A sense of adventure is certainly part of it. But there was more.

"We wanted a new home, but with five children we could never buy a new house at today's prices," says Mrs. Dziczkowski. "Besides, in spite of all the hard work, it's a good feeling to look around and know that we did all this ourselves."
