**If passed, the proposed earned income tax would raise an estimated \$875,000.**

The approximate breakdown of who pays is as follows:

- Residents: 16% or \$153,000
- Businesses: 12% or \$105,000
- Non-residents working in the Village: **72% or \$630,000**

**If failed, residents would pay 100% of the waste collection fees, totaling \$150,000.**

## **Proposed .5% Earned Income Tax:**

### **If the Levy Passes:**

- Safety services (police, fire, EMS) will remain the same.
- Waste collection, Leaf pickup and Brush chipping will remain the same.
- Repairs and improvements to public infrastructure, such as sewer lines, water lines, pavements and culverts, will be made.
- The Village will make improvements to Sagamore Road and repair secondary roads.
- General maintenance, including snow plowing and salting all Village roadways, will remain at current levels.
- Capital repairs and improvement projects will be funded.

### **If It Fails:**

- All planned road improvement projects will be suspended.
- Many services currently provided at no cost will be eliminated or assessed:
  - ◊ Brush chipping = eliminated
  - ◊ Leaf pickup = eliminated
  - ◊ Waste collection = assessed at \$150 annually
- Snow and ice control will be reduced.
- Village roads, equipment and infrastructure will continue to deteriorate.
- All senior and recreation programs will be eliminated or merged with other communities.
- An Inside Millage Committee will be created:
  - ◊ The Village property tax is presently 0.3% (lowest in Cuyahoga County).
  - ◊ The Village may raise the property tax without a resident vote to 3.88 mills. If you own a \$150,000 home, this would increase your property tax from \$13.78 per year to approximately \$178 per year.
  - ◊ The committee would investigate this necessity.

# SENIOR OR HANDICAPPED RESIDENT LAWN CARE PROGRAM

To be eligible to participate in the Senior or Handicapped Resident Lawn Care Program, you must be either a senior age 65 or older or have a handicap which prevents you from cutting the lawn, have earned income of less than \$10,000 and have no other person residing with you who is capable of providing lawn care service. Handicapped residents must provide a doctor's certificate relative to their handicap.

Residents can apply for lawn cutting and leaf pickup service, lawn cutting only or leaf pickup only. Applications are available at the Village Hall or can be downloaded from the Village website. Residents have the option of paying in full for the entire season or paying in two installments. A check, made payable to the Village of Walton Hills for the appropriate amount, should be included with the application. The application is to be mailed or placed in the Village Hall mailbox marked "Senior Lawn Care Program" on the outside of the envelope. All prices include edging driveways and walkways, collection and disposing of grass clippings and general trimming around trees and shrubbery.

Lawn cutting season is from approximately April 15th to October 31st. Leaves will be picked up in November. Maximum grass height shall be no higher than 3.5 inches throughout the lawn cutting season. The service provider is not responsible for removing leaves from flower/shrub beds. Residents may remove leaves from flower/shrub beds to be picked up by the service provider. Leaves will be placed at the street for removal by the Walton Hills Service Department.

Residents will sign a service agreement detailing the terms of the program with the lawn care provider. **Please note that the service agreement is NOT with the Village.** It is between the resident and the service provider. The Village is only acting as the bargaining agent for the program. The Village will monitor the performance of the service provider. Any complaints must first go to the provider for correction and not the Village. **There will be no priority list and cutting may not take place on the same day each week.** Service will be between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. Home address must be visible on mailbox.



# SPOTLIGHT ON CUMMINS BRIDGEWAY

*One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village*

Cummins Bridgeway is the Cummins distributor responsible for the sales and service of Cummins diesel and alternative fueled engines, power generation equipment, Cummins and Cummins Onan parts and related products. There are 15 service centers located in Ohio, Michigan, and Western Pennsylvania. Our community is fortunate to have one of these centers located at 7585 Northfield Road. Originally a distribution facility in the early 1970's, Walton Hills was the headquarters of Cummins of Northern Ohio. Different ownership took place over the years and in 2002 Cummins Bridgeway was formed with the merger of Cummins Interstate Ohio and Cummins Michigan. Last year the facility was upgraded. The front office and lobby area were remodeled, the outside building was completely painted and the parking lot was repaved.

Cummins, Inc., the parent company of Cummins Bridgeway founded in 1919, is a multinational Fortune 500 company and a global power leader. Headquartered in Columbus, Indiana, Cummins employs approximately 44,000 people worldwide and serves customers in approximately 190 countries and territories. Cummins earned \$1.66 billion on sales of \$17.3 billion last year.

Cummins Bridgeway serves many markets including: industrial, automotive, agricultural, marine, RV, mining, construction, military, bus, rail, oil and gas power generation. They take pride in their commitment to exceed customer expectations and partner with customers to help them succeed. Corporate social responsibility is part of their business strategy as defined by their mission statement, "Making peoples' lives better by unleashing the power of Cummins." They feel this statement embraces service to and improving the communities in which we live; healthy communities create a healthy business environment.

# Walton Hills Police Department Information

Over the past couple of months there have been rashes of residential burglaries in many northeast Ohio communities. Many of these communities border Walton Hills with up to 3 or 4 burglaries a day. One community to our south was even featured on the news for the amount of burglaries they were enduring. Residents need to be assured that the Walton Hills Police have increased residential patrols during day time and afternoon times when these burglaries are taking place. In 2012, Walton Hills had only one residential burglary as compared to numerous in other communities. In 2013, due to quick response and quick thinking, Walton Hills Police thwarted a would-be burglary in progress and took the burglar and his female companion into custody before a homeowner suffered any type of substantial loss. Remember, the greatest weapons in the fight to prevent burglaries are: LIGHT, TIME and NOISE.

## **LIGHT**

- Make sure that exterior lights are mounted out of reach, so they can't be unscrewed.
- Consider buying motion-sensitive lights which are now relatively low priced.
- Use a variable light timer to activate lights inside your home when you're not home.
- Trim trees and shrubs near doors and windows so burglars can't hide in the shadows.



## **TIME:**

Make it time consuming for a burglar to break into your home by:

- Installing deadbolt locks on all exterior doors (keyed inside and out).
- Installing double key locks in doors which contain glass. This will keep a burglar from being able to open the door by simply breaking the glass and reaching through. (Note: so that everyone in the house can get out in the event of a fire, be sure to keep the key in a designated place).
- Placing additional locks on all windows and patio doors.

## **NOISE:**

- For those able, get a dog. You don't need a large attack dog, just a dog to create a disturbance that burglars would prefer to avoid.
- If affordable and suitable to your budget, install an alarm system that will alert neighbors and police of a burglar's presence. Most systems can even summon police directly.

## **OTHER TIPS TO PREVENT BREAK-INS:**

- Think like a burglar. "Case" your home the way a burglar would and look for easy ways to enter your home.
- Be sure valuables (ex: guns, electronic devices & artwork) are not visible from the street or in front of windows.
- Be sure to lock up ladders and tools which could be used to break into your home.
- Work together with your neighbors. Join the Neighborhood Watch; let your neighbors know when you'll be away for an extended period of time.
- While on vacation, have someone pick up your mail and newspapers so they do not accumulate and alert burglars of your absence. Stop by the Village Hall and fill out a House Watch form with the Police Department.
- Display your house number conspicuously on your house and mailbox. This will help the police and emergency personnel find your home quickly.
- If you see something suspicious, CALL THE POLICE IMMEDIATELY on 9-1-1!!!



## **JUST IN CASE:**

- Make a list of your belongings (be sure to keep receipts) and update your list periodically.
- Keep copies of your list in a safe place or with a friend (also important if there's a fire).
- Photograph or video tape your possessions in a convenient way to keep records.
- Engrave your valuables with an identification mark to deter burglary to prove ownership should the articles be stolen and recovered by the police.
- Check with your insurance agent to be sure you have the right insurance coverage.

Hopefully these tips may help deter possible burglars cruising through the area and help keep Walton Hills a safe community for all of us.

**Brush Chipping to Begin - (but for how long?)** - Weather permitting, brush chipping will begin on Monday, April 8th. However, if the 0.5% earned income tax levy does not pass on May 7th, this valuable service provided at no cost to residents will be eliminated.

### Guidelines for Brush Chipping:



- No stumps or roots with dirt
- No foreign matter in brush piles
- Nothing larger than 8 inches in diameter
- Cut "Y" shaped branches in two
- No firewood
- No logs less than 4 feet long
- Separate small branches from large branches
- Face cut end of branches toward road

**Computer Round Up** - A Computer Round Up will take place at the Service Garage April 22nd through 26th from 8:00 to 3:30 p.m. Acceptable home computer equipment includes CPU's, monitors, keyboards, mice, printers, terminals, modems, cables, software, and ink printer cartridges. Cell phones and their accessories are also accepted. Computer equipment contains many hazardous components, which make them unsuitable for disposal in a landfill. By recycling computers, the metals, plastic and other valuable components in the equipment are recycled into new products. Computers turned in during this event will be recycled by RET3 Job Corp., a not-for-profit computer recycler. They have partnered with OneCommunity, another local not-for-profit broadband provider that works to give students technology skills for the workplace. Their goal is to place 50,000 computers in Northeast Ohio schools over the next five years. All computer hard drives received by RET3 are erased of all data using U.S. Department of Defense specifications. This secure system eradicates all the information stored on your computer and protects your confidentiality.



**Do You Want the Blueprints of Your House?** The Village Hall has the blueprints of several, but not all, homes in the Village. According to current record retention regulations, blueprints no longer need to be retained at the Village Hall. If you are interested in receiving your plans, you must first call Lisa Canzoni (440.232.7800) by April 30th to determine if they are available. If they are, she will inform you when you may pick them up.

Ordinance 2013-9, amends Section 242.13 of the Codified Ordinances with respect to vacation accrual on a calendar year basis for full-time police officers.

Resolution 2013-3, a Resolution of Appreciation for “Student Government Day.”

Resolution 2013-4, strongly opposes the passage of HB 5 by the Ohio General Assembly which proposes uniformity measures for municipal income tax in the form of unfunded mandates and a substantial loss of revenue.

Resolution 2013-5, authorizes the Mayor to enter into an agreement with Industrial Landscaping & Services, Inc. for a lawn care service program for senior or handicapped residents.

Resolution 2013-6, confirms the appointment of Joseph D’Amico as a member of the Planning Commission.

As a way to prevent identity theft, we will be offering a personal shredding service for our residents and businesses on Saturday, May 11th from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. You will have the opportunity to dispose of old financial statements, tax forms, bills, medical records and other paper without worrying about identity theft or the effect of dumping paper into the environment!

A powerful, mobile document destruction vehicle will provide quick, confidential destruction and recycling of your items to be shredded. Staples, binder clips and paper clips are acceptable. This program is only for Walton Hills residents / businesses; therefore proof of residency will be required. The shredder and bin will be located at the Village Hall parking lot off of Alexander Road. The program will proceed rain or shine.

**Please bring along a paper product for our food pantry. Without a donation, the cost will be \$5 for Walton Hills residents and \$10 for Walton Hills businesses.**

**We will shred:** bank statements, books with hard covers, brochures, cancelled checks, computer printouts, copy paper, envelopes, financial reports, folders, hanging file folders, greeting cards, ledgers, letters, magazines, medical records, pamphlets, tax forms.

**We will not shred:** plastic bags, boxes, paper products contaminated with food, clothes.

# EDUCATION ALTERNATIVES

## Holy Spirit Academy



To ensure the continuance of quality Catholic education, St. Mary, St. Pius X and St. Wenceslas schools united to form Holy Spirit Academy and opened as a merged school in August 2004. Located at 370 Center Road in Bedford, they are proud to serve those parishes and be the parish school of Our Lady of Hope Parish. Holy Spirit Academy serves about 120 students from Kindergarten to grade 8. They are accredited by the Ohio Catholic School Accrediting Association and hold a valid charter from the State of Ohio. 100% of 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade students achieve “At or Above Proficiency” on the Ohio Writing Proficiency Test and 14% of those students achieve “At or Above Advanced Proficiency.”

The mission of Holy Spirit Academy is to provide challenging academic experiences for students while nurturing their spiritual growth and sense of community. Their students and staff contribute to the Christian community and remain faithful to the Gospel message by cherishing honesty, maintaining integrity and providing service to others.

Holy Spirit Academy welcomes children of all faiths, but all students participate in daily Catholic religion classes and attend mass and a prayer service once a month. Their students come from Walton Hills, Bedford, Bedford Heights, Oakwood, Garfield Heights, Maple Heights, Warrensville Heights and Cleveland. They have small class sizes, averaging 15 students.

Holy Spirit Academy’s academic program encompasses all curricular areas and stresses the basics in the core content areas. Enrichment opportunities in reading and mathematics are provided. Students in all grades, including Kindergarten, are taught Spanish Language and Culture Enrichment. The Spanish teacher is from Argentina, and she provides students with a solid background into the Spanish language and culture. Computer education is integrated into the curriculum of Kindergarten through eighth grade to provide students with necessary technical skills. Fourth graders attend D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) classes. Fifth through eighth grade students attend Operation Keepsake classes, a sex education program based on abstinence and chastity that teaches students not to be swayed by peer pressure. An in-house spelling bee takes place during Catholic Schools week, which offers students another avenue to shine.

Every year the whole school participates in an Academic Fair. Every grade focuses on a certain topic and makes a visual presentation. Last year, the Academic Fair was combined with the Cleveland Clinic Explorers Program. The Clinic had a panel of art educators, artists, curators, writers and healthcare professionals evaluate the students’ submissions and 13 students received special recognition for their projects. The projects were on display at the Great Lakes Science Center for four months. Principal Sharon Vejdovec recognized this program as a wonderful way for the students to demonstrate their knowledge and arranged for the students to participate in the program again this year.

Holy Spirit Academy offers a variety of co-curricular activities for student enrichment, including Band (Grades 4 through 8), Choir (Grade 7), Drama Club and Play (Grades 5 through 8), Art Club (Kindergarten through Grade 3) and CYO Sports. Cross Grade Enrichment is taught to students in Kindergarten through 3<sup>rd</sup> grade. Teachers select items from their reading and math curriculum and expand it for all students in grades Kindergarten through three. Students in 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup> grade participate in service activities such as food drives, reading at mass and planning prayer services. Holy Spirit Academy partners with Chanel High School for a fitness walk every year. In addition, parents are invited to accompany their children on the first day of school and stay with them to meet the teacher, classmates and other parents and then all attend Opening Day Prayer Service. Parents are then invited to attend a social and browse displays from local civic agencies and businesses.
