Walton Hills Police Department Information

On October 29, 2013, the Walton Hills Police Department's 3rd Senior Citizen's Police Academy had its graduation ceremony in the Walton Hills Community Room. The Academy was initiated by Chief Thellmann on May 8, 2012 when the first Academy began with positive backing from Mayor Kevin Hurst and the Walton Hills Village Council. Dispatcher Kevin Artl assumed the position of Academy Commander to keep the Academy running smoothly.

The purpose of the Academy is to keep residents informed on what Police Officers, Police Auxiliaries, Dispatchers, and Firefighters do on a daily basis. It is run solely for entertainment and informational purposes. There are a lot of hands-on activities for the cadets, such as crime scene processing, fire safety sessions, police ride-alongs, CPR, basic first aid, and "mock" shooting scenarios. Most classes are instructed by Walton Hills Police Officers and the Oakwood Fire Department. During this third Academy, Officers from Oakwood Police participated in the teaching as well. The Academy was also opened up to Oakwood residents. Some of the classes taught were: Communications

Center Tour with Mock 9-1-1 Calls, Animal Control, Crime Scene Investigation, Fraud and Identity Theft, Crisis Management, Basic First Aid, Mock Shoot or Don't Shoot Range, SWAT Unit Demonstration, Bomb Disposal Unit, K-9 Demonstrations, and Fire and Electrical Safety Instruction.

On the tenth week of the Academy, there is a graduation ceremony for the cadets who have completed the nine week program. Awards are presented along with a graduation polo shirt. So far with the completion of the three Academies, 34 people have graduated. The Academy is funded solely on donations and proceeds from raffles and activities at Walton Hills' Community Day.

The next Academy is scheduled to begin in the spring of 2014. Anyone interested, ages 60 and over, please contact the Walton Hills Police Department for an application or more information. The classes are on Tuesdays from 10am to 12pm (two hours) for nine weeks. To see more pictures of the Academy and events, follow the Walton Hills Police Department on Facebook. Drug Drop Box in Village Hall Lobby

Improper disposal of medicine presents both a public safety and an environmental hazard.

Never flush prescription medication down the toilet or drain!

These medications will reach streams, lakes, and our drinking water supply. Some fish and amphibians exposed to waters contaminated by medications show signs of developmental and reproductive problems.

Walton Hills has taken steps to alleviate this problem by taking part in the Cuyahoga County Prescription Drug Drop Box Program. The drug drop box is located in the lobby of the Village Hall to the left of the window to the Walton Hills Dispatch Center.

Only pills are to be dropped off in the box; no needles or liquids will be accepted.

Update on Egbert Road

The Egbert Road Rehabilitation and Water Main Replacement Project is completed. The project has been a pleasant surprise for the Village for one main reason. The original estimate had the Village paying \$1,119,094.00 or 53% of the project. The Village's portion ended up to be \$175,703.49. This amount will be paid back (estimated annually at \$5,856.78) to the State over 30 years at 0.00%.

On July, 15, 2010, the Village of Walton Hills received a grant and loan approval for the Egbert Road Project from the "Ohio Public Works Commission" (OPWC). At that time the project was estimated at \$2,072,731. The OPWC approved a grant/loan totaling \$449,999 towards the project. \$103,637 was considered a grant and would not have to be paid back. The remaining \$346,362 would be considered a loan and the Village would pay back the loan over 30 years. In addition, the City of Cleveland would cover the cost of the waterline replacement estimated at \$850,000. The remaining \$772,732 would be the responsibility of the Village.

The resourcefulness and careful management of the Village can take credit for these savings. Everything that has been accomplished is an example of a true working relationship between Council and other departments at the State and County level. It demonstrates accountability. The two key components of the Village's substantial decrease in its financial stake were:

- Mayor Hurst's 2012 dialogue with Cuyahoga County and coming away with a grant for \$682,936.



- The Village received news from its Engineer that the resurfacing portion of the project would come under budget and save \$112,751. Initially the contract with Karvo Paving for the resurfacing portion of the project was established at \$1,211,225. The resurfacing final cost totaled \$1,098,474.

Another project on the horizon is the Sagamore Road Project. This project encompasses four communities (Walton Hills, Northfield, Valley View and Sagamore Hills Township), Cuyahoga and Summit counties, Cleveland Water Department and potentially the OPWC. The most recent estimate for the project is over \$4 million. The Village's portion is estimated at approximately \$425,000. The project is set to be completed by 2015.

Legislation Unanimously Approved At the 11.19.13 Council Meeting

2013 Council meeting minutes are available in their entirety on the Village website

Ordinance No. 2013-17, provides for the issuance and sale of \$175,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for constructing and installing road and traffic signalization improvements comprising the Alexander Road / Dunham Road Improvement Project.

Ordinance No. 2013-18, provides for the issuance and sale of \$105,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for acquiring and equipping service vehicles, including all necessary appurtenances.

Ordinance No. 2013-19, provides for the issuance and sale of \$145,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for acquiring and equipping police cars, including all necessary appurtenances.

Resolution No. 2013-33, authorizes a contract with Cuyahoga County for healthcare and prescription drug insurance coverage for all eligible Village employees.

Resolution No. 2013-34, authorizes a contract with The Standard Insurance Company for basic term life and AD&D insurance for all eligible Village employees and basic term life insurance for eligible retired employees of the Village.

Resolution No. 2013-35, a resolution in support of the "Lights Out for Hunger" program.

Resolution No. 2013-36, authorizes a contract with Liberty Ford Solon, Inc. for the purchase of three service vehicles.

Resolution No. 2013-37, authorizes a contract with Liberty Ford Solon, Inc. for the purchase of four police vehicles.

Resolution No. 2013-38, authorizes an agreement with Chapman and Chapman, Inc. to offer an alternate 457 Deferred Compensation Plan to qualifying Village employees.

Resolution No. 2013-39, authorizes an agreement with Lineweaver Financial Group to offer an alternate 457 Deferred Compensation Plan to qualifying Village employees.

As listed above, Resolution No. 2013-35 was passed by Council on November 19th. This resolution is in support of "Lights Out for Hunger," which was started by the City of Bedford to raise awareness of the growing problem of hunger in our community. This program raises funds to support two of our local food banks – the Southeast Clergy Hunger Center at South Haven United Church of Christ and Messiah International Ministries food bank.

To support the program, join the Village of Walton Hills and the City of Bedford and turn off your holiday lights on December 18th, and then donate your electricity savings or more to the "Lights Out for Hunger" campaign. The program will run from November 27, 2013 to January 8, 2014. Donations will be accepted any time throughout the campaign. Spotlight on

HOME CITY ICE

One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village

Did you know that water is the only known substance where the solid state (ice) will float in the liquid state (water)? Home City Ice has taken full advantage of this principle and has become an industry leading, multi-million dollar full service ice company. Home City Ice retails ice across all of Ohio, Illinois, Indiana, Kentucky, West Virginia, and parts of Michigan, Pennsylvania, Tennessee, New York, Maryland, Georgia, Missouri, Wisconsin and Alabama. They manufacture ice in 36 state-of-the-art manufacturing plants and 53 distribution centers throughout the Midwest.

One of Home City Ice's manufacturing facilities is located at 20282 Hannan Parkway in Walton Hills. They have been in our community since 1996. They employ 70 to 80 people during their peak summer season and 10 to 15 people in the off season. Their production facility is up and running every day of the week and through the night in the summertime, at which time they produce up to 240 tons of ice a day. In the off season, they operate five or six days a week. They produce 7 and 22 pound bags of ice. They are a civic minded organization that has happily donated ice for the Village's Community Day celebration for several years.

Home City Ice, headquartered in Cincinnati, Ohio, was started in 1924 by the Sedler family. They continue to own and operate the company. Home City Ice is passionate about making the healthiest, best tasting ice available, and they have developed a process that produces cleaner, clearer ice than you can make at home. Their unique freezing process, called "natural filtration," creates ice that is purer than the water from which it is made. Their process freezes water in motion, allowing the pure water to freeze

first. At the completion of the freezing process, the pure water has been made into ice and the left over "heavy" water is removed and used elsewhere in the refrigeration process. By freezing water in motion, air is not trapped in the ice, resulting in a solid piece of ice that will last longer. This is in direct contrast to the ice you make at home, where the water sits stagnant in trays waiting to freeze. The pure water freezes first on the outside, pushing suspended solids and debris into the middle of the cube where they will be trapped by the water freezing around them. A cloud is created as a result of these suspended solids and foreign debris being trapped in the middle of the cube. Home City Ice eliminates the clouds from the ice – just crystal clear ice frozen from pure water!

All of the Home City Ice production facilities have product samples tested by an independent third party laboratory to ensure a pure product. They are also a member of the International Packaged Ice Association, which mandates that every one of their production facilities be inspected and certified by the National Sanitation Foundation (NSF). On May 10, 2013, the Walton Hills facility was audited by the NSF and received a perfect score for the seventh consecutive year! This was the ninth perfect score for Home City Ice in the 2012-2013 audit season.

Home City Ice's unique production methods, the location of their distribution points, and their state-of-the-art routing technologies allow them to have one of the smallest carbon footprints per unit in the packaged ice industry. In addition, in 2012 the company purchased 60 Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) trucks. Two of these trucks were utilized in Walton Hills all summer. This was not only good for the environment, but it alleviated the problem of dealing with the high cost of diesel fuel and the cost to maintain diesel engines. CNG vehicle emissions are approximately 90 percent lower than those from traditional diesel vehicles. In the coming year, Home City Ice plans to purchase 100 more CNG trucks. Regional Manager Rick Wetterau is in the process of installing a CNG compressor at the Walton Hills facility so trucks can be fueled on site overnight.

The Walton Hills facility will have positions open in the springtime. Interested applicants can visit the Home City Ice website (www.homecityice.com) or apply in person. Their website will also let you test your "IceQ" or help you determine exactly how much ice you will need by way of their "Ice Calculator." Mr. Wetterau appreciates being a corporate citizen of Walton Hills – and we are glad to have his company in our community to produce the best tasting ice available!

Help Keep Our Streams Healthy: Adopt a Low (Road) Salt Habit

You have probably heard that too much salt in your diet can be bad for your health, but did you know it can also be harmful for your local waterways?

Sodium chloride, commonly known as "Road Salt", is the most commonly used de-icer on our roadways and driveways. As road salt works, it dissolves into its separate sodium and chloride components, which are easily carried by melting snow and ice into local lakes, streams, and wetlands.


It takes just one teaspoon of road salt to permanently pollute five gallons of water.

Below are some of the affects that road salt can have on our environment:

- At high concentrations chloride is toxic to fish and insects.
- At lower levels chloride can negatively affect the fish and insect populations by reducing reproduction and survival rates of young.
- Direct road salt splash can kill plants and grass.
- Sodium in road salt can destroy soil stability, decreasing the ability of the soil to filter water, and can increase soil erosion.

Tips for using road salt wisely

Since it is too costly to remove sodium and chloride once it has dissolved in the melted snow and ice, the best we can do is minimize its use, while maintaining safe roadways and driveways. There are many ways to reduce salt usage while maintaining safe conditions for your family this winter.



Follow these easy (and cost saving) tips:

- **Shovel (and use the right tool for the job).** The more snow and ice you remove manually, the less salt you will have to use and the more effective it can be. Whether you use a shovel, snow blower, snow plow, or ice scraper, **get out there as early as you can and keep up with the storm.** You may even decide that salt isn't needed.
- **15°F is too cold for salt.** Most salts stop working at this temperature. Use sand instead for traction, but remember that sand does not melt ice.
- **Application.** For best results, apply salt to cleared surfaces only, and consider purchasing a hand-held spreader to help you apply a consistent amount.
- **More salt does not mean more melting. Use less than 4 pounds of salt per 1,000 square feet.** One pound of salt is approximately a heaping 12-ounce coffee mug.
- **Sweep up extra.** If salt or sand is visible on dry pavement it is no longer doing any work and will be washed away. Use this salt or sand somewhere else, or store it for future use.

Walsh Jesuit High School

Walsh Jesuit High School, located at 4550 Wyoga Lake Road in Cuyahoga Falls, is a private four-year, co-educational, Catholic Jesuit college preparatory high school. Their current enrollment is 1,080 students, 52% being male and 48% female. Their motto, "Men and Women for Others," is at the very heart of the school's mission. It accurately reflects the school's desire to develop young men and women of competence, conscience, and compassion. Walsh Jesuit operates in the spirit of St. Ignatius Loyola, guiding students to be intellectually competent, open to growth, loving, religious, and committed to doing justice.

Walsh Jesuit draws students from an eight-county area and over 120 middle and parochial schools. They have been recognized twice as a Blue Ribbon School of Excellence by the U.S. Department of Education. They are the only high school in Northeast Ohio to receive this prestigious award twice! They do not award academic or athletic scholarships. They are, however, committed to providing financial assistance to qualifying families. Almost 40% of students receive financial assistance. An impressive 100% of their graduates attend colleges and universities across the country. Colleges have provided Walsh Jesuit students with over \$85 million in scholarships over the past four years.

Walsh Jesuit offers a dynamic blend of required and elective courses developed and presented by faculty members who will not permit students to compromise their potential. They offer 17 Advanced Placement courses and 17 Honors courses. The AP examinations are given in May. Students who take AP courses are required to take the AP exam.

The Department of Campus Ministry is important to each Walsh Jesuit student. The aim of the ministry is to develop Christian competence, conscience, and compassion within the student body. This is done through diverse and dynamic retreats, social justice, Christian service and immersion experiences, prayer and sacramental life, and spirituality. The Christian Service Program is one of the students' key formative experiences.
