Scamming the Elderly

Another scam has been brought to the attention of the Walton Hills Police Department. These people are targeting the elderly. The victim receives a phone call from a person that identifies themselves as a Law Enforcement Officer. On occasion the caller has used the name of an actual Law Enforcement Officer. The caller states to the victim that there is an ongoing investigation with the victim's bank. The caller somehow knows where the victim does their banking. The caller states that the victim has counterfeit money in their account and the caller requests their assistance in the case. The caller requests that the victim withdraw money from their account. Somehow the caller knows how much money the victim has in the account and asks the victim to withdraw less than the full amount. The caller informs the victim that if anyone at the bank asks why they are withdrawing such a large amount of money, they are to tell them that it is for an investment.

The caller informs the victim that once the money is withdrawn from the bank they will meet them in a parking lot and the caller will give them the location of that parking lot. When the caller and the victim meet, the victim hands the money over to the person that is waiting in a car. The person in the car is usually dressed in a suit or business casual. This person informs the victim that they appreciate the help and that an Officer will be in contact with them. The money is gone and the victim never receives a call.

Remember if something sounds too good to be true, or in this case unbelievable, don't be afraid to contact the police department or contact one of your family members (son or daughter). Explain to them what you're being asked to do. In these cases, victims have lost their entire life savings to these scam artists or criminals.

Family Distress Scams

Another popular scam that the Walton Hills Police have come across is a scam where con artists pose as grandchildren. They call with a false story, explaining that they are in trouble or in jail in another city or country and need you to send money via a wire transfer. Of course any money you send will go to the scammer, not your grandchild. When in doubt, ask the caller a question only your family members would know how to answer and call your son or daughter to confirm the location of your grandchild.

Contractor Scams

With the warmer days of summer rapidly approaching us, residents need to be aware of contractors or companies that come up to your door. Door to door contractors may offer to repair your roof, pave or seal your driveway, or trim or remove trees for a good price, telling you that they are in the area and may have extra materials or time to do the job. After you pay, however, the contractor disappears without ever doing the work or does a poor job. Scam artists may say that they will give you a discount on the leftover supplies from repairing another house in your neighborhood. These are false promises and nothing more than tricks to steal your money. To avoid scams:

Contractor Scams (continued)

- Beware of contractors that show up at your door. Ohio law requires that sellers give you a three-day right to cancel most door to door sales, and no work should begin before the three days.
- Research the contractor by calling the Ohio Attorney General’s Office, Better Business Bureau or the Walton Hills Village Hall to see if the contractor is registered in the Village.
- Don’t make large down payments or pay in full until the work is satisfactorily completed.
- Get the exact cost in writing or in a contract, but don’t sign anything until it is confirmed that the company is reputable and registered and bonded with the Village. Don’t accept verbal estimates.

Fake Sweepstakes or Check Scams

Someone may fictitiously claim that you have won the lottery, a contest, or a prize, or send you a check for a large sum of money that you have never signed up to win. To collect your winnings however, you will be asked to pay a fee. Often, you’ll be instructed to send money via wire transfer or money order, possibly to a foreign country. They’ll tell you to expect your winnings once you pay, but the prize never arrives. Remember, legitimate sweepstakes are free and require no up-front payments. If you receive a check for a large amount of money and are instructed to deposit it, do not. Once you deposit or cash the check and it is found to be good, you become responsible for all the money withdrawn from your bank. Tear it up and discard it immediately or contact the police department.


NOTEWORTHY ACHIEVEMENTS OF OUR YOUNG RESIDENTS

Healthy Trees for a Healthy Watershed




Trees have many benefits for communities and homeowners, including helping to slow and absorb rainwater. This helps to reduce the amount of stormwater that rushes off surfaces, and therefore reduces the amount of debris and pollutants that are carried to local water sources. Less than 19% of the land within the Tinker's Creek watershed remains forested. Increasing the number of trees within the watershed helps to achieve important goals, such as reducing the occurrence and severity of flooding, which is one reason to make sure trees are planted correctly to maximize their benefits.

Don't Drown the Roots! Tree roots require water, oxygen and warmth to grow correctly. When tree roots are buried too deep under mounds of soil and mulch, the amount of oxygen and water that reaches the roots is reduced. A tree responds by sending the root system towards the surface to seek out oxygen and water. This requires the tree to work overtime just for basic needs and reduces the amount of energy used to develop a strong root system.

Some trees in this situation are able to develop normally over time while others have a shorter life span and can suddenly die during wind or ice storms. Not only do we lose this tree to provide stormwater benefits, it can also add to the amount of woody debris that enters our waterways, causing damming and erosion of streams. Furthermore, unhealthy trees with shallow root systems do not promote the absorption of water into the ground as well as healthy trees with deep root systems, which provide a better pathway for water to filter into the ground.

WALTON HILLS LAKE MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

The Village of Walton Hills has reinstated the contract with the Walton Hills Lake to provide recreation services for the benefit of Village residents. This contract allows the children in the Parker Program to use the Lake two days a week for two hours. Also, the Lake will be free of charge to *all* residents on opening day, July 4th and Labor Day and during select events. In addition, this agreement allows the Lake the opportunity to lower the cost of membership. A revised application containing the new rates will be published in the June issue of the *Owl* or can be picked up at the Village Hall. All applications for membership are due before June 30, 2013, thereafter a \$25 late fee will be required, with no exceptions. The new rate structure is as follows:



- Individual (one adult 21 to 65) **\$90**
- Individual plus children **\$90** plus **\$18** per child age 2-20 (Maximum **\$144**)
- Couple (two adults, both 65 or under, or one 65 or under) **\$126**
- Couple plus children **\$126** plus **\$18** per child age 2-20 (Maximum **\$180**)
- Senior (individual over 65) **\$54**
- Senior Couple (two adults over 65) **\$72**
- Senior plus child/children staying or visiting on REGULAR BASIS during the summer **\$54** plus **\$18** per child age 2-20 (Maximum \$108)
- Senior couple plus child/children staying or visiting on REGULAR BASIS during the summer **\$72** plus **\$18** per child over age 2-20 (Maximum **\$126**)
- College Individual (ID required) **\$75** (3 guest limit)



Mike has owned Walton Hills Auto Service since March of 2006. He handles all of the auto repairs and his wife is his “Administrative Assistant,” handling all of the paperwork. He also has three employees – Alexandra, Greg and Tim, who help him out. The Auto Service is open Monday through Friday from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. and Saturday from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. They are closed on Sunday so that Mike and Katherine can spend quality time with their three children. While not working, Mike also likes to pursue his favorite pastime – he is an avid fisherman.

This is Mike’s first experience as the owner of an auto repair/gas station. Prior to that, he worked as a mechanic at a Marathon gas station in Euclid for 15 years. He proudly and actively served in the U.S. Army during Desert Storm and Desert Shield from 1989 to 1993.

Mike services all vehicles – imports and domestic. He provides all automotive services except transmission repairs. This includes complete brake service, air conditioning service, wheel alignment and balancing, failed E-Check test repairs, shocks and struts, complete exhaust repair, and computer diagnostic testing. He also has great tire prices! He is one of the few remaining establishments that still offers free air to his customers. When the station is closed, customers can take advantage of the air pump that is located outside of the gas station. However there is a \$1 charge for this service.

Mike’s philosophy is simple – be service oriented and take care of your customers. When he is working on someone’s car, he will give them a ride home if they are in need. He also offers a full service pump for customers who don’t like to pump their own gasoline. In addition, he offers a discount to his cash paying customers.

EDUCATION ALTERNATIVES

SHJ Middle & High School



The Sacred Heart of Jesus (SHJ) Middle & High School is a chartered, private school (grades 6 through 12) in its third year of operation. It is located at 14660 Alexander Road in Walton Hills. It is the only school located in Walton Hills, and the only private high school in a ten mile radius.

The school is a mission of the Sacred Heart of Jesus parish, yet it is a non-denominational entity; you do not need to hold certain religious beliefs for your child to attend the school. Students are expected to share Christian values and moral standards, know and respect the Ten Commandments, and show respect to God by proper participation in morning prayer services and Bible classes (if applicable). The mission of the school is “to prepare ethically focused long learners with highly developed academic and social skills, sensitive to the changing needs of our communities.”

SHJ Middle & High School began its first year with seven students. Enrollment has increased each year, and this year twenty-one students attend the school. This includes seven foreign exchange students from the countries of Korea, China, Taiwan and Japan. Three families in Walton Hills are host families for four of the students. Their average class size is between six and seven students.

SHJ Middle & High School charges affordable tuition, but also participate in State funded financial aid such as vouchers and Educational Choice and offers scholarships and grants. Tuition is \$5,000 a year for Middle School students and \$7,000 for High School students. However, Walton Hills residents receive a discount and can attend Middle School for \$3,000 a year and High School for \$5,000 a year.

SHJ Middle & High School’s academic program encompasses all curricular areas and stresses the basics in the core content areas. Advanced Placement classes are offered in Biology, Chemistry, Bio-Chemistry and Calculus. Foreign language courses are offered in Latin and Russian. They have interesting curriculum classes in psychology, where they encourage students to learn to uncover their own desires and feelings and to teach them to be sensitive to those of others. They are dedicated to a strong concentration of music for any student who feels they possess musical talent and expresses a desire to pursue this interest. They provide instrumental classes and support as well as vocal training. Students participate in auditions and concerts. They also offer the Post-Secondary Enrollment Options Program (college credits for Tri-C and other colleges) and provide flexible scheduling and transportation. Extra-curricular activities include karate classes, swimming activities, Chinese class, modern literature, art studio, band and choir. They offer their students exciting field trips, such as excursions to New York City; Chicago; Berlin, Ohio; Kalahari Waterpark; Cedar Point; and the IX Amusement Park.

The SHJ Middle & High School advertises a strong no-bullying policy, which means safety on a physical as well as a moral level. They base their extra-curricular activities and free times on traditional values and won’t tolerate offensive or inappropriate behavior or remarks.

The SHJ Middle & High School is a perfect alternative to public education for children who respect differences and embrace their fellow students in mutual respect and solidarity. It is also perfect for children whose academic goal is based on good working habits and honesty and who are looking for a school that allows them to work at their own pace and possibly graduate early.
