Dear Residents,

We have just embarked on our one year anniversary of dispatching for the Village of Oakwood. This endeavor has provided better services and more accountability and has saved us as well as Oakwood money.

Monday through Friday we have two dispatchers for two eight hour shifts (16 hours a day) and on weekends we have two dispatchers for an eight hour shift. Our residents still can call 440.232.1313, our non-emergency police line, after business hours and on weekends for information on tickets, tow releases and general information. This has been a very adventurous project that has worked out very well for our Village.

We are currently finding out if any other communities are interested in having our Village provide them with dispatching services. Their price would be substantially lower because they would not have to establish the service. In addition, since we have two communities already involved, a third and/or fourth community would have a very minor start-up cost to our Village. In addition, it would be a more efficient way to monitor Code Red and other emergency programs through our community with professionals providing information to residents on issues that would occur.

We also are embarking on the one year anniversary of our fire contract. This is nothing new; we did have a contract with Oakwood before. What is new is that we are saving money because we are doing their dispatching. It offsets the cost of our fire protection. Also, we picked up a building out of this contract that was paid for totally by the Village of Oakwood. Basically, our Village only donated the square footage of land on which to erect the building.

We have two paramedics on duty 24 hours a day, 7 days a week with their truck parked inside of the garage building in the Village Hall parking lot. This has cut down the response time to our residents by over one minute and 45 seconds. This quicker response time 24 hours a day, seven days a week is very important when trying to save a life. Our police officers are our first responders, but our fire department would be our primary responders to any kind of emergency involving the risk of life in our Village. We will continue to provide these services that benefit our residents as well as our businesses.

Report from Council President Pro Tem Denny Linville

The most asked question of Mayor Kevin Hurst and Council members is how much money will Walton Hills expect from the advent of the "racino" going up on Northfield Road, Northfield Village? An effort is made in the following text to give some sort of explanation of what has happened and what is hoped for going forward.

The Village of Walton Hills and the City of Warrensville Heights truly received the "short-end of the stick" recently. Late in June, the State legislature decided to totally shut out two of the nine Ohio racetrack communities in sharing any of the new "racino" money. Mayor Hurst and Mayor Brad Sellers of Warrensville Heights (also famous for inbounding the ball to a double teamed Michael Jordan for "The Shot") have not given up.

Historically, horse wagering tax revenues from Northfield Park have been divided equally between Northfield and Walton Hills. The horse wagering tax for Thistledown is also shared equally by North Randall and Warrensville Heights. The reason for the equal sharing of the wagering tax is because Northfield's flying turn on the northern side is approximately 35% in Walton Hills and a portion of Thistledown's backstretch is in Warrensville Heights.

The maximum annual amount divided to both communities totals \$60,000. Therefore each community received a maximum of \$30,000 each. Columbus, on the other hand, receives a maximum amount of \$60,000 annually since Scioto Downs is entirely within the Columbus border. The sole purpose of this distribution was to reimburse communities for expenses incurred due to racing meets.

Over the last several years, the State granted all seven Ohio racetracks the ability to operate a "racino". With that, the State also stated that it **shall pay one million dollars to the municipal corporation or township in which each commercial racetrack is located & an additional \$1 million six months after.** The State's bottom line intent was to distribute \$14 million in total. The language had to be amended because with nine communities and seven racetracks, the distribution would have to be \$18 million.

Without any notification from our/your local state representatives (our former Mayor), the State's legislature changed the allocation formula to exclude Walton Hills and Warrensville Heights from receiving any money due to the fact that less than 50% of the racetrack is located in each respective community.

The Village contacted Josh Brown, an Ohio Municipal League legislative advocate; Mr. Brown contacted Senator Bill Coley from Butler County who sponsored the allocation change. The Senator stated that the change was prompted by the department that will be distributing the new "racino" money. He also stated that he was against any distribution of "racino" money to any of the municipalities and was only aware of one Ohio racetrack that shared two municipalities and that the one municipality only had a few feet of the racetrack in their community. He was not aware that Northfield Park is approximately 35% in Walton Hills.

The Village later on learned that our State Representative (our former Mayor) contacted the Walton Hills Engineer about the percentage of Northfield's racetrack in Walton Hills. Our State Representative (our former Mayor) represents Walton Hills, not Northfield Village. Having been mayor for 10 years, don't you think she would have known what is and is not in our community? Needless to say, the communities of Walton Hills and Warrensville Heights are not pleased with the unfair act of the amended legislation and will continue to pursue a fairer way of distributing the "racino" money.

The Neighborhood Watch Program was created in response to the concerns of citizens about crime. It improves relations between the police and the community to help reduce crime. This program is a free crime prevention program. Residents on a street form a communication chain. They make a commitment to watch out for each other's homes, and report suspicious activity to the police and to each other. Residents also keep each other informed about neighborhood occurrences, burglaries, theft and other crimes or problems. A helpful tip to remember is if the situation does not feel right or makes you feel apprehensive, write down the description of any suspicious person, and get the model, color and license plate of any suspicious vehicle. Call the police immediately and don't assume someone else has already called.

How can you get involved? Contact the Walton Hills Police Department at 440.232.1313 or stop in and fill out an application. This program is still in the beginning phase and we are looking for more residents to help aid our Neighborhood Watch Program.

2013-2014 Senior Snowplowing

At the time of publication, a snowplowing provider had not been selected and therefore a price had not been determined. However, we will know the price by Monday, October 7th. If a qualifying senior is interested in this service, a one-time payment in full will be required by Friday, November 1st to cover the entire snowplowing season.

Snowplowing will take place when the snowfall equals or exceeds three inches in the majority of driveways. A reasonable effort will be made to clean turnarounds and side entry garage aprons. However, equipment limitations may not allow for total snow clearing of these areas. Snow will be cleared within two feet of garage door openings.

Please keep in mind that this service is provided as a safety measure for access of emergency vehicles and may not be adequate for your needs. You may want to consider hiring your own contractor to plow your driveway to your exact specifications.

RULES FOR QUALIFICATION FOR THE SENIOR OR HANDICAPPED RESIDENT SNOWPLOWING PROGRAM

To be eligible for participation in the Senior or Handicapped Resident Snowplowing Program, you must meet the following qualifications:

Senior:

- 1) Resident of the Village of Walton Hills.
- 2) Age 65 and older.
- 3) Have earned income less than \$10,000.00 (will be verified by the Walton Hills Tax Department).
- 4) Have no other person residing with the resident who is capable of providing snow removal service.

Handicapped:

- 1) Resident of the Village of Walton Hills.
- 2) Handicapped and not able to remove snow because of handicap.
- 3) Have earned income less than \$10,000.00 (will be verified by the Walton Hills Tax Department).
- 4) Have no other person residing with the resident who is capable of providing snow removal service.
- 5) Must provide a doctor's certificate relative to the handicap.

In the last 12 months, the Village of Walton Hills has gone in a different direction to provide an informative publication to its residents and businesses. We sincerely believe that informed residents become educated residents and make educated decisions. They know the truth and disregard rumors.

In July of 2012, after several letters and phone calls, we had a meeting with another publication in our Village to try to resolve and renew an expired contract which had been in place for the past nine years. The meeting was not productive and no issues were resolved. We decided to publish Village information in the August "Liberty News and Views." After the August publication, we decided to go in a different direction and start our own publication, the "Walton Hills Journal." We are coming up on the one year anniversary of this publication and we have improved it tremendously. We are fortunate to have advertising to offset our cost and our method of delivery has improved. However, there is still a lot of misinformation regarding our publication.

competitive bid and separate ourselves from the "Liberty News and Views." We received a very competitive quote from Akland Printing, a local business owned by one of our residents. Our publication is a quality, vibrant information piece in full color, it reaches all residents and businesses, and it is sent separately through the U.S. Postal Service.

The cost of our publication/mailing is \$1,200 a month. We currently receive \$400 a month in advertising. Our goal is to obtain enough advertising to cover all of our publication and mailing costs. We are even in discussion with other communities and our school system to provide a better product with more pages and more information.

We are trying to be informative, transparent, and productive. In no way have we taken anything away from the other publication in our Village. We want to stress that we would more than embrace the other publication stepping up, putting their differences aside, and be willing to work together. But you know in the world of business that not all businesses work together and not all information is shared equally.

We sincerely believe that informed residents become educated residents and make educated decisions. They know the truth and disregard rumors.

For record and informational purposes, we spent on average between \$300 and \$500 a month for Village information to be printed in the other Village publication, which was hand delivered. However, we felt it would be just as important to reach our businesses as well as our residents and we also felt that we could produce a better publication with color print and more vibrant pictures and art work. So, through the 11 months of trial and error, we were very successful in accomplishing all of these tasks by having our publication inserted in the center of the "Liberty News and Views."

After this task was accomplished, we decided to go out a third time for quotes from some of our local printers to see if we could find a

So once again, we will continue to be transparent and we ask you to please hold us and our publication accountable. Our books are open; you can see the money that is coming in and the money that is going out. Household Hazardous Waste Disposal

The Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District has partnered with Walton Hills and 58 other communities in Cuyahoga County to offer a Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Program. Household hazardous wastes are materials that are marked dangerous, caustic or flammable. The District can only accept materials that originated from a household and not a commercial source. Latex paint will not be accepted. It is comprised mostly of water and is not a hazardous material. To dispose of latex paint, solidify and place with your curbside trash. Ace Hardware, Lowe's Home Improvement, The Home Depot, and True Value Hardware have national compact fluorescent light bulb (CFL) recycling programs. Customers can simply bring in any expired, unbroken CFL bulbs, and place them in the store's proper recycling container.

Household material accepted

- Oil or solvent-based paint, sealers, primers, or coatings (aerosols or liquids)
- Varnishes, polyurethanes, shellacs
- Paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine
- Pesticides, herbicides, fungicides
- Caustic household cleaners
- Pool chemicals
- Automotive fluids, motor oil, car batteries
- Adhesives, roof tar, driveway sealer
- Kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid
- Mercury, fluorescent bulbs (6 ft. length max.)

Materials NOT accepted

- Latex paint
- Explosives, gun powder, ammunition, flares
- Medical waste, pharmaceuticals, medicine, sharps
- Radioactive waste (i.e. smoke detectors)
- Tires
- Electronic, appliances
- Business waste
- Commercial waste
