Legislation Unanimously Approved at the 11.17.15 Regular Council Meeting

Council meeting minutes are available in their entirety on the Village website

Ordinance No. 2015-6 amends the Village's municipal income tax code to be in compliance by House Bill 5.

Ordinance No. 2015-8 provides for the issuance and sale of \$120,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for acquiring and equipping police cars, including all necessary appurtenances.

Ordinance No. 2015-9 provides for the issuance and sale of \$300,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for constructing and installing road and traffic signalization improvements comprising the Alexander Road/Northfield Road Improvement Project, including all necessary appurtenances.

Ordinance No. 2015-10 provides for the issuance and sale of \$600,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for constructing and installing road improvements comprising the Sagamore Road Reconstruction Project, including all necessary appurtenances.

Ordinance No. 2015-11 provides for the issuance and sale of \$95,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for acquiring and equipping service vehicles, including all necessary appurtenances.

Ordinance No. 2015-12 provides for the issuance and sale of \$160,000 of notes in anticipation of the issuance of bonds for constructing and installing road and traffic signalization improvements comprising the Alexander Road/Dunham Road Improvement Project, including all necessary appurtenances.

Resolution No. 2015-34 supports the "Lights Out for Hunger" program (see below).

Resolution No. 2015-35 approves the lot consolidation and lot split at 7401 Northfield Road.

Resolution No. 2015-36 terminates the Job Creation Incentive Grant with NPK Construction.



On November 17th, Walton Hills Council passed Resolution No. 2015-34 in support of "Lights Out for Hunger." This program raises funds to support two of our local food banks and raises awareness of the growing problem of hunger in our community. Village residents and businesses are asked to join Walton Hills as well as Bedford, Bedford Heights and Oakwood Village and turn off their holiday lights on December 16th and donate their electricity savings or more to the Lights Out for Hunger campaign, which will run from November 25th – January 10th. Checks should be made out to the "Southeast Clergy Council" and sent to: First Baptist Church of Bedford, 445 Turney Road, Bedford OH, 44146. Please include "Lights Out for Hunger" in the memo section of your check. Funds collected will be split between the Southeast Clergy Hunger Center at the South Haven United Church of Christ and the Messiah International Ministries Food Bank.

Holiday Season Safety Tips

There are just a few weeks until Christmas and the National Crime Prevention Council reminds shoppers to keep safety in mind as they hunt for those Christmas gifts because criminals will be out looking for a steal.

- Don't buy more than you can carry. Plan ahead by taking a friend with you or asking a store employee to help you carry your items to the car.
- Save all receipts to verify your purchases after the Christmas season.
- Consider alternate options to pay for your merchandise, such as onetime or multiuse disposable credit cards or money orders, at online stores and auction sites.
- Wait until asked before taking out your credit card or checkbook. A thief would love to look over your shoulder to get your account information.
- Tell a security guard or store employee if you see an unattended bag or package.
- Deter pickpockets. Carry your purse close to your body or your wallet inside a coat or front trouser pocket.

- Have your keys in hand when approaching your vehicle. Check the back seat and around the car before getting in.
- Do not leave packages visible through your car windows. Lock them in the trunk or, if possible, take them directly home.
- If you're shopping with children, make a plan in case you're separated from each other.
 - Select a central meeting place
 - Teach them to know they can ask store personnel or store security employees if they need help
- If you shop online, keep your personal information private and your passwords secure. Don't respond to requests to verify your password or credit card information unless you initiated the contact.
- Beware of "bargains" from companies with whom you are unfamiliar, if it sounds too good to be true, it probably is!
- Be sure to use secure websites for purchases. Look for the icon of a locked padlock at the bottom of the screen or "https" in the URL address at the top of the screen.

During the holiday season, it's not always about being safe when shopping. You also need to be safe on the road and at home. December has some of the busiest travel days of the year, so make sure you're extra careful on the roads. Keep your car doors locked and windows up. Do a thorough check on your car before making a big trip. Remember, texting while driving is illegal and dangerous. Extra law enforcement officers are usually on patrol during this time of the year looking for distracted and impaired drivers.

At home you can take extra precautions to avoid home burglaries; ADS Security has a few recommendations:

- Secure all doors and windows.
- Decrease visibility. Don't keep valuable possessions (big screen TVs for example) in places where they can be seen from outside of your house. This attracts burglars to your home.
- Light up your house. Use exterior lighting and motion sensors to light up your house at night. The extra light will make it more difficult for burglars to intrude without being seen.

Fiscal Officer's Report

Pursuant to the passage of Amended Substitute House Bill 5 in December 2014, new State mandated municipal income tax guidelines have been established for tax years beginning January 1, 2016 and thereafter. The new municipal income tax laws can be found in Chapter 718 of the Ohio Revised Code. The State of Ohio also mandated the Village to amend its income tax ordinances. Chapter 890 of the Villages' Codified Ordinances addresses tax years prior to tax year 2016 and newly created Chapter 891 addresses tax years beginning January 1, 2016 and thereafter.


For individuals filing a 2015 Walton Hills tax return, the first impact of the new laws relates to the Declaration of Estimated Tax for 2016 found at the bottom of the 2015 individual tax return. The new State law requires that every taxpayer shall make a declaration of estimated taxes if the amount payable as estimated taxes is at least two hundred dollars (\$200). Previously, the threshold was established by the Village at four hundred dollars (\$400), but in order to be uniform with all other municipalities the amount will be set at two hundred dollars (\$200).

There is also a change in the payment due dates for individual estimates:

- 1st quarter 22.5% due by April 15th, previously April 30th
- 2nd quarter 45.0% due by June 15th, previously July 31st
- 3rd quarter 67.5% due by September 15th, previously October 31st
- 4th quarter 90.0% due by December 15th, previously January 31st

Retired people who previously have not filed due to not having taxable income will now be required to file a special form annually stating that they have no taxable income. The return will be a simple non complicated form that will provide information that the individual is still living in the Village without any taxable income.

For tax year 2015, all individuals filing with the Village must attach a copy of the first page of their Internal Revenue Service form 1040. This will help ensure the Village that all taxable income is being presented on the Village's tax form.



2015 preprinted income tax forms will be available at the Village Hall or can be downloaded from our website. There is also an interactive electronic "auto calc" form also available on our website. It is recommended that only Internet Explorer or Safari web browsers are used for the "auto calc" form. Once completed, the calculated return can be printed out, signed and sent to the Village along with any supporting documentation.

The Village of Walton Hills continues to pride itself on customer service. The proximity of having the tax office in the Village is an added benefit where your municipal income tax return can be prepared at no cost by a member of the Finance Department.



Winter Safety Awareness

Ready or not, winter is coming, and the Cuyahoga County Office of Emergency Management is offering suggestions for keeping safe during severe winter weather. Take the threat of severe winter weather seriously. Most winter weather deaths are indirectly related to winter storms. People die in traffic accidents on icy roads, of hypothermia from prolonged exposure, of heart attacks from over-exertion (like shoveling heavy snow), and from house fires caused by improper use of space heaters. One of the primary concerns is the winter weather's ability to knock out heat, power and communications services over a large area, sometimes for days at a time. Heavy snow and extreme cold can immobilize an entire region.

Tips for a Wonderful Winter:

- Prepare at home with emergency supplies that include three days' supply of food and water, a battery-powered and/or hand-crank radio with extra batteries, a first aid kit and necessary medications, blankets and warm clothing, pet items (food, medications, etc.).
- Keep a winter emergency kit in your vehicle which includes bottles of water and granola bars or other non-perishable food; bags of sand or cat litter to provide traction under tires; hats, gloves and blankets; cell phone chargers; snow shovel and ice scraper; emergency flares.
- Bring pets inside. If you're cold, they're cold. If you can't bring them in, make sure outdoor animals have adequate shelter, unfrozen water and food.

- When the weather is very cold outside, let the cold water drip from the faucet served by exposed pipes. Running water through them, even at a trickle, helps prevent pipes from freezing because the temperature of the water running through them is above freezing.
- Keep your home warm, even at night. You might have slightly higher heating bills but you will reduce the chance of costly frozen pipes.
- If your pipes do freeze, do not thaw them with a torch. Thaw the pipes slowly with warm air from an electric hair dryer.
- Turning on the stove for heat is not safe; have at least one of the following heat sources in case the power goes out: extra blankets, sleeping bags, and warm winter coats; fireplace with plenty of dry firewood or a gas log fireplace; portable space heaters or kerosene heaters.
- Keep space heaters at least three feet from other objects. Never leave them unattended.

Spotlight on

Julius S. Kerekes

One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village

When you ask Julius S. Kerekes about his life, he simply replies in his quiet, soft-spoken voice, "God has blessed me with the most wonderful life." That soft-spoken voice may not have been so quiet during one of the most horrendous times in history, World War II; more on his military service a bit later.

First, let's meet Julius Kerekes who also goes by the nicknames Jay and Jack. Julius is 93 years young, born on January 23, 1922 in Bedford. Julius graduated from Bedford High School in 1939 where he studied typing, shorthand and bookkeeping, all of which helped him while he served in the US Army under General George S. Patton; again we'll dive into his time in the military soon.

After high school, Julius attended the Dyke Business College for one year before joining the Dougherty Lumber Company in 1940. While there, Julius worked as a secretary to the wholesale manager and did counter and telephone sales. In 1942 Julius was drafted into the US Army. After his military service, Julius returned to Dougherty Lumber Company in 1945 and met his wife of 68 years, Grace. Julius says that meeting Grace was "one of the greatest highlights of my life."

Another highlight of his life was serving in the army during World War II. When he was drafted, Julius joined the 69th Medical Regiment in Camp Maxey, Texas. In 1943 Julius was sent to Fort Sam Houston in San Antonio where he trained to become a member of the Third Army headquarters staff, which gathered information on both Ally and Axis Forces during the European invasions of World War II.

On March 13, 1944 Julius, along with the other members of the Third Army, boarded three ships and headed overseas to Europe. Julius traveled on the French



liner "Ile De France" which had to zigzag through the waters to avoid the German submarines. The "Ile De France" successfully landed in Scotland where Julius and the other members of the Third Army headquarters staff traveled to Knutsford, England by train.

The headquarters for the Third Army was located on the second floor of an English mansion called Peover Hall and that's where Julius first met General Patton. There was a ballroom on the first floor of Peover Hall known as the "War Room." The "War Room" had several maps pinpointing where American and Allied Forces were and where German Forces were located. The G-3 Operations Section posted the American forces and the G-2 Intelligence Section, Julius's section, posted the German Forces. Since he was the highest ranked enlisted man in the G-2, Julius supervised the men posting information on German Forces, meaning Julius was around General Patton a lot. Julius says during that time he witnessed a number of tactical decisions.

About a month prior to the Invasion of Normandy (June 6, 1944), General Patton was assigned the job of preparing a fictitious Allied Forces alternate invasion of France. Julius said that General Patton gathered a group of officers in the "War Room" to discuss the plan and needed someone with stenographic ability to record the meeting. That's when Julius was called upon by his boss, G-2 Colonel Oscar Koch. When asked what it was like working with General Patton, Julius

replied, "I was shaking in my boots as General Patton dictated a summary of the proposed operations." On December 24, 1944 Julius was awarded with the Bronze Star Medal for his meritorious service which was pinned on his lapel by General Patton.

After the war, Julius returned to the United States and married Grace in August 1947. The couple built their home on Spanghurst Drive in 1948; it was the first house on the street! Julius and Grace were blessed with a daughter, son and grandson. Also in 1948, Julius began working for WEWS-TV5. During his forty years working in television, Julius held several positions, including national sales manager for 13 years. When channel 5's parent company Scripps-Howard Broadcasting moved its headquarters from New York to Cleveland, Julius became the executive assistant to the president of Scripps-Howard. Julius retired in 1988.

Julius and his wife Grace have been active in Walton Hills and the surrounding communities throughout their lives. Julius is a lifelong member of St. Mary Church in Bedford, he's a member of the Walton Hills Men's Club (Grace was a charter member of the Women's Club), the 50-Plus Club, and the Bedford Historical Society.
