Dear Residents,

We will be having a special town hall meeting in mid-February to discuss the Sagamore Road Rehabilitation and Water Main Replacement Project. The entire process will take quite a few months to be completed. A tentative project schedule was published in the last issue of the *Journal*. This meeting will be of interest to all of Walton Hills residents living on Sagamore Road as well as residents from Sagamore Hills located within the area where the construction will be taking place. When our engineering department has finalized a meeting date, residents that will be affected by this project will be notified. Affected residents will also be kept informed of time delays that can be expected.

More good news for the month of February – Hollywood has come to Walton Hills! Final production plans are in the works for the filming of the feature film "50 Fathers." The movie will be filmed exclusively in Northeast Ohio, with over 80% being filmed in Walton Hills and the other three communities of the Bedford City School District. There will be cameo appearances by your elected officials and several different sites in our Village will be featured, including some of our homes, businesses, churches and our Village Hall. Local men age 35-60 were invited to a special casting call held in the Community Room in January. The plans are for the film to premier in Cleveland theaters and seven other markets around Father's Day.

"50 Fathers" is a dramatic comedy which follows the life of the best high school athlete in the nation, Dominique Hathaway or "Nique," who plays for the Bedford Bearcats. He is a three sport Blue Chip All-American and a sure fire top five MLB or NFL draft prospect. He appears to have it all, but the one thing that is missing in his life is something that he and his brother have never had but always dreamed of – a father. Together with a group of friends, Team Nique, he launches a social media campaign to find a father. He vows to interview 50 candidates and pay the best prospect, upon the start of his signing a professional contract, \$10,000 a month to be a father to him and his brother.



Walton Hills Police Department Information

The Police Department was well within its budget and in recent years has stepped up its revenues outside its normal traffic tickets. A comparison of revenues received five years ago in 2009 to those received in 2014 is listed below:

Dispatching: The Village contracted with Oakwood Village to provide dispatch services for a five year period beginning August 1, 2012. The initial contract was established at \$130,000. Subsequent years have been increased by 2.0% or the CPI, whichever is greater.

OVI Task Force: The Village continues its relationship with University Hospitals in conducting saturated patrols and checkpoints to combat impaired driving. Money is funded by the Ohio Department of Public Safety and University Hospitals for the remuneration of Village police overtime.

Community Diversion: The Village receives grants from Cuyahoga County in support of a program that allows a juvenile to avoid formal court action and instead utilize community resources to address problems brought to the attention of the court. Typical community resources utilized by the magistrates include community service hours, referral to counseling services, participation in prevention programs, drug and alcohol testing and curfews.

Police Car Rental: During 2014 the Village received \$3,000 from Northfield Park Associates for the rental of a decommissioned police vehicle at the Northfield Park Race Track for a period of one year. Money was also received for the monitoring vehicle and pedestrian traffic relating to Ben Venue at the corner of Northfield Road and Forbes Road. Other monies were received for traffic control in the escorting/moving of Ford's large transformers through the Village.


Prisoner Housing: The Village currently contracts with Oakwood Village to house its prisoners and also receives funds from Cuyahoga County for the reimbursement of placing County prisoners in Walton Hills' jails.

Towing: The Village charges \$10 for every tow release that the Village administers at our dispatch center.

Alarm Billing: False alarm charges are made to Village residents and business owners in control of their property in which an emergency alarm is installed. Warnings are issued at no charge for the first three false alarms on an annual basis. A charge of \$25 is assessed for the fourth false alarm and all subsequent alarms during a calendar year for residential users and \$50 for the fourth false alarm and all subsequent alarms during a calendar year for business users.

Immobilization: The Village receives \$35 for each license plate that it turns in to the Ohio Bureau of Motor Vehicles upon their order.

Asset Sales: During 2014 the Village utilized GovDeals.com, a service that allows governmental entities to sell vehicles and equipment that are no longer in use or needed.



Walton Hills to Institute the *R.E.S.C.U.E.* Program A Potential Life Saving Program!

WALTON HILLS, OH — (February 2015) — Walton Hills Mayor Kevin Hurst has announced plans to launch ***R.E.S.C.U.E.***, a potential life-saving program that provides emergency service personnel with vital information on residents during times of emergency. This program is a new informational unit that is only available to Walton Hills residents at this time. Other communities have already expressed interest in this program, which will be available to them once it goes public. We are proud to be able to offer the ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** unit program at no cost to our residents.

What does the acronym R.E.S.C.U.E. stand for?

Residents ***E***xchange information concerning ***S***afety that can be ***C***ommunicated by ***U***nitng all safety departments in the time of an ***E***mergency.

R.E.S.C.U.E. is a program that provides emergency service personnel with the information they will need to take the best possible care of our residents, while also informing them of who needs to be contacted in case of an emergency.

The ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** unit is a small USB device that residents can hang on their refrigerators. It stores important information, such as medical allergies, medications taken, and possession of a living will or DNR order. In the case of an emergency, fire, police and EMS personnel can plug in a resident's ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** device and immediately view vital information that allows them to best care for the individual, as opposed to hoping the resident can respond to questions or attempt to access medical records.

To receive a ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** unit and become a part of this program, residents can call the Village Hall (440) 232-7800 and make an appointment to come in to answer the medical and basic information questionnaire; then that information will be up-loaded onto the ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** unit. All of the information the resident provides will remain confidential; the Village will not sell personal information. Each ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** unit will also be protected by a passcode that needs to be entered to access the ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** unit.

"During an emergency, it can be difficult or impossible to communicate necessary medical information to emergency personnel," said Mayor Hurst. The ***R.E.S.C.U.E.*** unit alleviates that concern, ensuring that the emergency personnel can get the information they need, quickly, to best take care of a resident in need."

Final Gift

Councilwoman Gloria Terlosky, Information Committee Chairwoman

During our lives we give of our time, our talents, and even our resources to other people in our lives. We are, and especially Americans are, second to none when it comes to giving. We are the first ones to volunteer if a national disaster occurs, no matter what the country; we are there ready, willing and able to help. This donating of time, talent and resources does not stop with human beings; our animal creatures receive the same outpouring of love from us as well. I think we as Americans are born with a special gene, a giving gene if you will; it is innate. Where there is a need we will respond.



This summer I was attending a picnic and I started to talk across the table to a friend of mine who works for an organization called Lifebanc. It is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organ and tissue recovery organization who receives its financial support from individuals, corporations and foundations. Her job is to recover organs from someone who has died, as a result of a car accident, gunshot wound, suicide or a stroke. I said "I do not know how you handle that type of work; it takes a special type of person to see what you have to see and to be able to do the job you do." Talking about seeing, she is now certified to do cornea eye recovery. To be able to give someone the gift of sight! How great is that!

And I was absolutely right. My friend is special. We talked about her job and I asked question after question. I was fascinated by the answers I received and the knowledge I acquired. Thank God for people like her. Organ and tissue recovery is performed in a sterile environment by trained professionals who treat the deceased and their loved ones with the utmost respect and compassion. They believe in their work.

You may not have heard about Lifebanc, but it has been around for almost 25 years. Last year it helped heal and save more than 25,000 lives. Also, Lifebanc was instrumental in helping to perform

the nation's first near-total face transplant and establishing the world-record for lung transplants in a year.

I learned that an organ donor could be 8 months to 80 years of age. One organ donor can save as many as 8 lives; a tissue donor can enhance the lives of over 50 people. Of all the organs – heart, kidneys, liver, lungs, pancreas and small intestine – the kidney is the most requested; about 70% of the transplants involve the kidney. And from tissue recovery they can recover bone, ligaments and tendons, corneas, heart valves, skin and veins/vessels.

There are 110,000 people in the U.S. waiting for organ transplants, more than 1,800 right here in N.E. Ohio. Every 10 minutes a new name is added to the national waiting list. In Ohio, 56% of individuals with a driver's license or State I.D. have signed up for organ donation. That is a lot but the demand is still greater.

The most interesting fact which my friend told me was that giving your consent as an organ donor on your driver's license is NOT ENOUGH. Lifebanc is required to have the consent of a legal next of kin (i.e. spouse, parent) at the time of your demise. A family member can override the driver's license consent. So please take the time to discuss YOUR wishes with your family. Contact Lifebanc at 216.752.5433 for any questions you may have regarding donating.

So if you want to give a gift that keeps on giving, that does not cost anything to you, your family or your estate, you might want to consider donating your FINAL and most precious gift, for in that gift, you have the power to change someone's world.

Spotlight on

Denny Kolar

One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village

Denny Kolar is a simple guy who leads a simple life. He appreciates the beauty of the world around him. He is not the kind of guy that wants to be sitting on a couch watching television. He would rather be taking a walk in the Metroparks or working in his garden. He loves the natural surroundings that are so abundant in Walton Hills, where he has lived on Alexander Road for 16 years.

Denny grew up in Maple Heights and graduated from Independence High School. He also attended and graduated from the Cuyahoga Valley Joint Vocational School (now called Cuyahoga Valley Career Center) with a degree in automotive repair. He became an automotive technician for Reliable Oldsmobile in Independence, where he worked for four years. However, this profession was not his destiny.

The Kolar family business, K & K Meat Shoppe, has provided Denny with a rewarding career. Denny's grandfather, Yaro, along with his sons Jerry and Dennis (Denny's uncle and father) started the business in the 1950s in Cleveland. In 1979, Dennis established K & K Meat Shoppe in Maple Heights located at 6172 Dunham Road in the Turney-Dunham



Shopping Plaza. This provided Denny with his first employment opportunity – washing dishes for his father. He is now the owner of the Maple Heights store. His mother, Bonnie, has enjoyed working at the store since the day it opened in 1979. In 2001, Denny helped his father open a branch in Mantua located at 10682 Main Street. The Kolar family is proud of their Bohemian and Hungarian heritage, which is reflected in the selection of meats available in their two stores.

Denny is self-sufficient and a true outdoorsman. He has a wood burning stove and heats his house with wood. He used to be an avid archery hunter, but ever since he moved into Walton Hills and learned to appreciate the abundance

of wildlife, he couldn't do it anymore. Living in Walton Hills made him enjoy, appreciate and protect Mother Nature. Denny is an apiarist, or beekeeper, who collects his own honey. He used to be very paranoid about getting stung by a bee. However, now this is not an uncommon occurrence, because he has two active hives, each containing 30,000 bees. Denny also produces his own maple syrup from the trees on his property. He taps the trees, collects the sap, and boils it down to produce maple syrup. He learned to raise bees and collect maple syrup through reading books, but also picked up pointers by watching educational television shows. He also loves to garden. However, his greatest pleasures in life are his pets; his four chocolate labs and two cats are his pride and joy.

Denny absolutely loves Walton Hills. He feels the community has a lot to offer. He loves the natural surroundings - the "country in a city feel" – and enjoys being so close to everything yet so far away. He thoroughly enjoys the Walton Hills International Raceway at T.G. Young Park. He can't say enough about the Walton Hills Police Department; he feels very safe and secure all of the time. He enjoys the seniors in the Village and has fun catering many of the senior lunches.

What does the future hold for Denny? He will always be involved in the specialty portion of the food industry with meats and cheeses. He would also like to get back into racing cars, which he did when he worked in the automotive industry. However, his vision of his end game would be to find a nice lady to retire with. 


