## Legislation Unanimously Approved at the December 16, 2014 Council Meeting

- Ordinance No. 2014-14** makes final permanent appropriations for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2014.
- Ordinance No. 2014-15** makes permanent appropriations for the fiscal year beginning January 1, 2015 and ending December 31, 2015.
- Ordinance No. 2014-16** allows the Tax Administrator certain discretion relating to the penalty assessed on delinquent estimated tax payments and/or unpaid taxes when due.
- Ordinance No. 2014-17** repeals and replaces Chapter 260 of the Codified Ordinances titled "Employees Generally."
- Resolution No. 2014-43** renews a contract with AlwaysCare for dental insurance for eligible village employees.
- Resolution No. 2014-44** renews a contract with AlwaysCare for vision insurance for eligible village employees.
- Resolution No. 2014-45** authorizes an agreement to pay the Bedford School Board funds due under the Enterprise Zone Agreement between the Village and Homeworks, Inc. dba Arhaus Furniture for tax years 2005 through 2013.
- Resolution No. 2014-46** congratulates the Bedford Bearcat Varsity Football team on their outstanding season.
- Resolution No. 2014-47** authorizes an agreement to transfer land owned by the Village located between the Fuel Mart gas station and the railroad track east of Fuel Mart to Fuel Mart.





## Beware: Recent IRS/FBI Scam to Residents and Businesses

**IRS-Impersonation Telephone Scam:**  
An aggressive and sophisticated phone scam targeting taxpayers, including recent immigrants and businesses, has been making the rounds throughout the country. Callers, usually with a heavy accent, claim to be employees of the IRS, but they are not. These con artists can sound convincing when they call. They use fake names and bogus IRS identification badge numbers. They may know a lot about their targets, and they usually alter the caller ID to make it look like the IRS is calling.

Victims are told they owe money to the IRS and it must be paid promptly through a pre-loaded debit card or wire transfer. If the victim refuses to cooperate, they are then threatened with arrest, deportation or suspension of a business or driver's license. In many cases, the caller becomes hostile and insulting. Or victims may be told they have a refund due to try to trick them into sharing private information. If the phone isn't answered, the scammers often leave an "urgent" callback request.

Note that the IRS will never: 1) call to demand immediate payment, nor will the agency call about taxes owed without first having mailed you a bill; 2) demand that you pay taxes without giving you the opportunity to question or appeal the amount they say you owe; 3) require you

to use a specific payment method for your taxes, such as a prepaid debit card; 4) ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone; or 5) threaten to bring in local police or other law-enforcement groups to have you arrested for not paying. If you are going to be notified by the IRS or FBI of any debt or delinquency, you are usually notified by certified mail, not a threatening phone call. If you receive a call like the one mentioned above, promptly hang up the phone; do not give the person any of your information like your address, social security number, date of birth, etc. Do not call them back; if they call you back, do not answer the phone.

**Notify the Walton Hills Police immediately of any calls received of this nature. REMEMBER THESE ARE SCAMS, PEOPLE TRYING TO STEAL YOUR MONEY AND/OR IDENTITY!**

# Fiscal Officer's Report

## Annual Budget

The fiscal year (FY) 2015 budget was recently passed by Council on December 16, 2014. The FY2015 budget is estimated to utilize \$396,000 of the Village's cash reserves. Additional appropriations were necessary for an additional biweekly pay (\$90,000) which occurs every 11 or 12 years. In addition, a \$50,000 payment to the Bedford Schools is slated in early January. This represents the first of several income tax payments owed to the schools since the previous administration did not include the Bedford School Board relating to the 2004 Arhaus Enterprise Zone property tax abatement.

The Village's cash reserves are estimated to end the 2014 year at approximately \$3.3 million. The Village's cash deficit for FY2014 is estimated to approximate \$350,000. The Village's actual and estimated cash deficits for the five year period (2011 – 2015) is expected to average approximately \$416,041 annually. This compares very favorably to the previous five year period (2006 – 2010) when the Village experienced an average cash deficit of approximately \$1,095,588 annually, decreasing the Village's cash reserves from \$10.5 million to \$5 million during the five year span.


## Income Tax

Once again, Walton Hills' residents will not receive a preprinted income tax form. In order to reduce Village expenses, residents will be receiving a notice with information relating to 2014 estimated taxes paid to Walton Hills, tax credits carried forward from prior years, prior years' taxes owed and any prior year tax returns

pending. Residents who are noted as retired and not working (inactive) **will not** receive such notice and **are not** required to file.

Preprinted income tax forms are available at the Village Hall or can be downloaded from our website. We can also send or fax a tax form to you. There is also an interactive electronic form available on our website. Once finished, the calculated return can be printed out, signed and sent to the Village along with any supporting documentation.

As stated in the *November 2014 Journal*, estimated tax payments will be emphasized with your 2014 filing. Taxpayers expecting to owe more than \$400 for the 2015 tax year are required to pay one fourth of the annual liability by April 30th or with the filing of their 2014 annual tax return. The enforcement of estimated taxes will provide a more balanced cash flow stream for both the Village and the taxpayer.



# Plan This Winter to Improve Tinkers Creek Next Spring

There is never a bad time of the year to think about what can be done to improve the watershed of Tinkers Creek. What better way is there to escape from Old Man Winter's impending visit than to start planning for springtime projects? Here are some ideas that will do just that, and will also kick start your efforts to improve and protect the Tinkers Creek Watershed.

- **Plan a Rain Garden** - There are numerous on-line resources to get you started...simply search "rain garden plans" in your browser. Another option is to contact the Tinkers Creek Watershed Partners or your local county soil and water conservation district to request a copy of "Rain Garden Manual for Homeowners". If you're feeling more adventurous, there is still time to actually construct your rain garden and prepare it for a springtime planting.
- **Build a Rain Barrel** - Be ready to capture the rain from those springtime storms and have plenty of water available when you are ready to plant your vegetable garden and new landscaping.



- **Construct a Compost Bin** - Again, there are numerous plans on-line, and there are a wide variety of materials that can be used. The best designs provide three bins: one to add fresh produce scraps and yard wastes to; one to "cook" the compost; and the last to store finished compost.

- **Perform Soil Tests** - Know what nutrients your soil has too little of, or perhaps too much of, so you can prescribe the best early-season fertilizer application. Contact your local Ohio State University Extension office.

Don't know what to get that person with a wintertime birthday that has everything? Consider the following gift ideas that will help friends and loved-ones get a head start on their own watershed-friendly projects: faucet aerators and low-flow water fixtures; soaker hoses; a water filter system or a water filter pitcher; a compost tumbler or a pre-fabricated compost bin; a pre-fabricated rain barrel or a do-it-yourself rain barrel kit; soil test kits; books on any of the above topics.

# Street Commissioner's Report

I hope you had a wonderful Christmas and enjoyed spending quality time with your family and friends. A new year is upon us and my wish for you is peace, health and happiness – and a winter that is sunny and mild (not like last year!). Whatever the weather, we will do our best to ensure the safety of all of our residents and those who pass through our community.

**Christmas Tree Disposal** - Live Christmas trees will be picked up by the Service Department beginning the first week of January, weather permitting. Any live Christmas trees can be brought out to the roadside with all decorations, wires, lights, etc. removed to prevent damage to the recycling equipment.

**Trash Pickup Affected/Not Affected by Holidays** - Trash is not collected on New Year's Day; therefore trash pickup will be delayed one day that week and the collection day will be Saturday, January 3rd. Although Monday, January 19th is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and a federal holiday, it will not affect the trash collection that week. Trash will be picked up on Friday as usual that week.

**Mark Your Calendar for This Year's Recycling Roundups** - As we have done for the past several years, the Village will be participating in the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District's (CCSWD) recycling programs. All collections will take place at the Service Center located at 6800 Dunham Road from 8am to 3:30pm. ## Sagamore Road Rehabilitation and Water Main Project

The estimated total cost of the Sagamore Road Rehabilitation and Water Main Project will be just under \$4.1 million. Two separate contracts, one for the water main and one for the road, will be awarded. The first contract will be awarded for the water main replacement and is expected to go out for bid in February 2015. The amount of this contract is expected to be around \$2.3 million, representing approximately 57% of the total project cost.

The second contract will be for asphalt rehabilitation and is tentatively scheduled for bid in April, 2015. The estimated cost of this contract is \$1.7 million, representing approximately 43% of the total project cost.

Walton Hills is serving as the financial agent for all four communities (Walton Hills, Northfield, Sagamore Hills, and Valley View). We will invoice each community their share of the cost when the bids for each project are accepted. After work has been completed, Walton Hills will reconcile any final costs with the other participating communities.




