Dear Neighbors and Friends,

As we start the month of June, we want to share some very positive information that has and will benefit our Village to a great extent. First, we had our annual observance of the "National Day of Prayer" on May 7th at the Prevailing Church on Alexander Road. The program was well attended by many of our residents as well as visitors from Oakwood Village. All of the participating church leaders shared excellent messages with our audience.

Second, we would like to announce that the Village of Walton Hills and the Township of Sagamore Hills have posted that we will be considering entering into a contract to designate a joint economic development district under O.R.C. 715.74 to be known as the "Village of Walton Hills – Sagamore Hills Township Joint Economic Development District."

Third, I hope you have had a chance to witness the improvements taking place at the corner of Alexander Road and Northfield Road to match all of the other improvements around our Village. Most of this project is being paid for through donations from Northfield Park Race Track and the Hard Rock Rocksino. As you can see, we have some major projects and events taking place in the Village that exemplify positive government and strong leadership. The outlook for the future of the Village, both long term and short term, is very bright indeed!

One more noteworthy announcement - #50 Fathers, the movie filmed exclusively in Northeast Ohio, is out in theaters! Over 80% of the scenes were filmed in Walton Hills and the other three communities of the Bedford City School District. Locally, the film had its red carpet movie premier in Euclid at the Atlas Cinemas Lakeshore 7 on May 22nd and at the Tower City Cinemas on May 24th. It also premiered in Atlanta, Chicago, Columbus, Detroit, Memphis and Washington D.C. There are cameo appearances by myself and Councilman Brian Spitznagel! #50 Fathers is a dramatic comedy which follows the life

of the best high school athlete in the nation who plays for the Bedford Bearcats. He and his friends launch a social media campaign to find a father, the one thing missing in his life. He vows to interview 50 candidates and pay the best prospect, upon the start of his signing a professional contract, \$10,000 a month to be a father to him and his brother. Looks like a winner!

“Project Blue Light”

The color blue is symbolic of “PEACE.” By displaying your blue light(s) you send a message that you support America’s Peacekeepers, your light is guiding them to safety, and you hope the year will be peaceful. “Project Blue Light” is a nationwide recognition of those police officers who have died in the line of duty. It began in 1988 in Philadelphia when Dolly Craig wrote a letter to Concerns of Police Survivors stating that she would be honoring her late son-in-law, Philadelphia Police Officer Danny Gleason, during the holiday season by placing a blue light in her window. In 1999 the Horsham Township Police Department planted a tree in Deep Meadow Park on Horsham Road as a memorial to those officers. The evergreen tree is decorated every holiday season with 1,000 blue lights representing all law enforcement officers. We would like to ask each of you to please consider placing a blue light in your window during the holiday season to show your support for your police officers.

June Environmental Message Give Dad a Break!

Consider the following when caring for your lawn:

- Brown-yellow dormant grass is normal during summer's heat. If you require a green lawn during this time, water deeply – one inch of water two times a week.
- Relieve lawn stress by applying gentle, slow fertilizers like compost, compost tea or sea kelp. Synthetic, chemical, high-nutrient fertilizers increase stress on lawns.

- Read the weeds for a healthy lawn. Every weed tells a story and gives clues about lawn conditions. Learn to identify weeds and react accordingly.

DID YOU KNOW? Dandelions are not native to North America. Early European colonists brought dandelions over as a source of food and medicine. Dandelion greens are highly nutritious, containing more Vitamin A, K, calcium and iron than broccoli per one cup serving.

Undercover Boss

If I am home on a Friday night there is one thing I like to do to raise my spirits and restore my faith in my fellow man; I watch a program called "Undercover Boss." The premise of the program is that a president or CFO of a company changes his or her looks and appearance by putting on a disguise and goes to work in their own company unbeknownst to their employees. It could be a major fast food restaurant, casino, factory, or any type of organization in any town USA. The boss learns firsthand the situations and problems that occur in their company by actually having to perform the duties their employees face day after day. It is any eye opening experience that does not go unnoticed.

At the end of the program the undercover boss meets with the employees they have worked beside. The list goes on and on. To date in the last couple of years, the undercover bosses have given away over six million dollars to these well deserving employees.

I invite you to watch "Undercover Boss." You will not be sorry you did. It is reality, true reality, not Kardashian reality; everyday

people working to make a buck putting one foot in front of the other to make it through the day to take care of their families. I was humbled watching some of these employees. If you think your job is difficult and you are not being paid enough, just watch a few of these episodes and see how the other guy makes a living and what is expected of him. And to you bosses out there, yes, you, why don't you spend some time out on the floor or in the office, or on the phone and experience what your employees deal with on a daily basis? 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
Fiscal Officer's Report

This article was written with the assistance of Joe Maroun, a graduating senior from Walsh Jesuit High School, who spent three weeks with me gaining real world experience in many aspects of finance as part of his "Senior Experience."

The State of Ohio's Local Government Fund (LGF), which takes a portion of the State's major revenues and redistributes it to Ohio's 88 counties and municipalities, has decreased its allocation almost in half. The net result for the Village of Walton Hills may not be as substantial, as it has seen its allocation drop from \$74,224 in 2009 to \$37,541 in 2014. But for larger cities like Cleveland (see table on next page), a drop from \$46 million to \$25 million for the same years is significant.

The State has basically fostered a "survival of the fittest" by decreasing its revenue sharing to local governments. Over the next decade, many municipalities will implement shared services with other communities or consolidate by merger. Prior to these moves, most local governments will streamline operations, encourage economic development, reduce employees' salaries and benefits, eliminate non basic governmental services or increase taxes. The flowchart below depicts the difference in money distributed for the years 2009 and 2014.

Bill Deak

One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village

Resident Bill Deak started out his adult life on the high seas after graduating from Orange High School in 1948. He enlisted in the Navy and was assigned to the destroyer USS Leary. He cruised out of Providence, Rhode Island to the Caribbean for maneuvers and training. The ship was ready to go the Mediterranean for a year, but because he did not have enough service time, he was transferred to the destroyer USS Beatty. He sailed out of New Orleans, Louisiana and headed to the Caribbean for two weeks of reserve training. He made four trips and was discharged with six months of reserve duty remaining. He worked in the fire rooms and engine rooms on both of these ships.

He returned home for a few months and worked as a boiler repairman, oiler and fireman at the Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland. He was sent to engineering school to prepare for the State of Ohio fireman and engineering licenses to enable him to operate high pressure boilers and related equipment.

A short time later, the Navy was calling again. He was sent to Bayonne, New Jersey to work on the recommissioning of the Battleship New Jersey. After a month the ship was sea-worthy, and he and 2,000 sailors sailed to their new home port in Yokosuka, Japan. Their mission was to serve in the Korean War, and they sailed up and down the coast for 30 and 40 days at a time. After one year of this tour of duty, Bill returned to the states.

After more than four years of active duty, Bill was looking forward to being discharged from all Navy obligations. With just a few months of service time remaining, he renewed the promise he made to Jean, his high school sweetheart. They were married on January 5, 1952. He returned to work at the bank for a few months and then heard the news that Ford broke ground for a new Stamping Plant in

Walton Hills. He applied for a job and was hired as a fireman. After a few months he was promoted to shift engineer and later to chief engineer. He retired in January of 1989 after 35 years. In addition, he had a small business where he installed antennas for color televisions in the late 50s and 60s. He loved to climb on rooftops, which he did over 100 times in the greater Cleveland area!

Bill and Jean were blessed with three children, (Debi, Bill and Bernie), 15 grandchildren and 12 great grandchildren. Debi and her husband Terry Kozak and Bill and his wife Joyce live in Walton Hills. Bill and Jean have been residents for 54 years. They moved into their home on Egbert Road in 1961 and became very active in the community. Bill has been a member of the Walton Hills Lake and Men's Club for many years. He was also a trustee of the Lake for several years. Soon after he retired from Ford, he offered his assistance with the printing of the *Owl* and volunteered his time for 15 years. His mechanical expertise kept the *Owl's* obsolete printing equipment in working order. Bill also helped the late resident Bill Cottrill make and repair *Owl* delivery tubes. Jean joined the *Owl* collating team in 1989. Bill and Jean volunteered because they wanted to give something back to the Village. This was also why their family donated the eagle that sits

on top of the Veterans Monument at the Village Hall. Because of Bill's exemplary community service, he was honored as the Citizens' League "Citizen of the Year" in 2007. Bill also volunteered on the Maintenance Committee at St. Mary Church in the mid 1970's and served as president of AARP Chapter #4931 for several years.

Bill and Jean traveled a lot when their children were young. They went to Fort Lauderdale every year, where they stayed at their favorite motel and met up with families that also returned each year. They also took memorable trips to Kansas City, Pikes Peak, Colorado, Los Angeles, Knots Berry Farm and Disney Land. After their children were grown, they continued their traveling ways. They flew to Europe and visited Italy, France, Spain, Switzerland, and England. They took 12 cruises, traveled through the Panama Canal and down around the southern horn of South America, cruised to Alaska, visited Fiji, and toured Australia and New Zealand for four weeks.

Bill and Jean are very civic minded residents who can often be seen at Council and Committee of the Whole meetings. They care very much for their community, and they are very grateful for everything the Village has given to their family!
