Dear Neighbors and Friends,

Spring is upon us, the flowers are in bloom, the birds are singing, and we can start to enjoy the warm weather! We need to bring it to your attention that our trash contract is expiring this year. We have been aware of this since last October. As a member of a consortium group, we have had discussions with many other communities and have been evaluating our options for a new contract. We were able to "piggyback" onto the bids of another community which not only saved us time and money, but resulted in keeping our trash and recycling collection with the Kimble Companies.

Council will be awarding the contract in May or June. July is when the contract will begin. With this new contract, we will still have unlimited trash removal and we will provide our residents with two trash carts at no cost, one for recycling and one for solid waste. The recycling cart is 65 gallons, and the solid waste cart is either 65 gallons or 95 gallons. This does not mean that trash has to go out every week; when your trash carts are full you roll them out to the road. These units will be picked up by an automated truck. When emptied, residents can easily roll them back to the outside of their garage. The carts are lightweight and tamper resistant as far as animals are concerned.

This new contract will save the Village approximately \$30,000 over the next five years. It is a win-win situation for everyone involved. This is our main goal and is an example of good government in action. We understand that some residents will be hesitant to utilize the carts. Those residents have the option of putting out one trash bag weighing not more than 40 pounds each week. The majority of residents are expected to embrace the new trash carts because they are commercial grade, very durable and free! This state of the art automated program provides the Village with the opportunity to increase our recycling footprint and pursue a positive program that benefits our residents.

Please join us for our annual Memorial Day program at the Village Hall on May 25th at 8:30am. This is a very special day when we remember and honor the brave men and women of the armed services who gave their lives for our freedom. On that note, please let's remember to be thankful for what we have. Let's all enjoy the beauty of springtime and look forward to the warm and sunny summer months ahead!

Walton Hills Police Department Information

To the residents of Walton Hills,

I would like to introduce myself. I am Officer Joshua Wendl, and I am currently working as a part-time patrolman for the Village of Walton Hills. I have recently taken on the responsibilities of animal warden. To tell you a little bit about myself, I have 17 years' experience working in the animal control industry for various companies. I have been working for the Village of Walton Hills for approximately two years. It is the animal warden's responsibility to deal with all animal complaints in the village, domestic and wild animals alike.

In dealing with domestic animals, the Village of Walton Hills has various ordinances regarding your responsibilities to your animals and other village residents. Below are two of them:

1. Ordinance No. 618.01, Dogs and Other Animals Running at Large, states your dog must be under reasonable control.
2. Ordinance No. 618.07, Barking or Howling Dogs, states no person shall keep or harbor any dog within the Municipality which, by frequent and habitual barking, howling or yelping, creates unreasonably loud and disturbing noises of such a character, intensity and duration as to disturb the peace, quiet and good order of the Municipality.

The Village of Walton Hills provides a service when the animal warden deems an animal a nuisance. With that being said, we have a large population of wild animals thriving in the area. These animals have a tendency to enter your yards; this does not always constitute a call for the animal warden's service.



I would like to bring to your attention minor housekeeping details to avoid interaction with these wild animals that are native to this area:



1. Please secure all trash receptacles.
2. Clean up unnecessary yard debris. Wood and brush piles and compost receptacles invite unwanted pests.
3. If you are going to feed the birds, please feed them away from the house to keep the deer, mice, chipmunks, and other rodents away from your dwelling.
4. Lawn insects and grubs attract skunks and raccoons. Lawn maintenance is necessary to keep these pests away from your home.

The residents of Walton Hills need to remember that we live in an urban wooded area where small animals tend to thrive.

If you encounter damage done to your home or other parts of your residence, you should contact the Police Department at 440.232.1313. I or the acting animal warden will be notified and an appropriate time will be scheduled to meet with you to discuss your problem. You will be provided with the necessary services to avoid further damage to your property. All nuisance animals will be dealt with following the guidelines set forth by the Ohio Department of Natural Resources.

Congratulations Sergeant Walsh!




Reflections on Memorial Day

It is believed Memorial Day was originally chosen to be May 30th because flowers would bloom all over the country to decorate the graves of the fallen. It is now observed on the last Monday of May. Please recognize those who made the ultimate sacrifice.

May Environmental Message Mother Earth – Treat Mom Right

- Mow high at three or four inches and let clippings lie on the lawn. Save money, time, and prevent over application of nutrients by letting the grass clippings add nitrogen to the soil as nature's fertilizer.
 - Don't mulch or compost clippings with annual weed seed heads. Instead, bag it up and dispose of in the trash to prevent more weeds being introduced to your lawn.
 - Continue to hand pull or spot treat weeds with an organic weed control spray.
 - If Japanese beetle grubs are an issue and soil conditions are right, apply Milky Spore to control the population. One application lasts for ten years.
 - Reduce or eliminate pesticides to protect children and animals.
- DID YOU KNOW?** Beneficial nematodes do more than control grubs; they are also effective on flea and tick larvae, helping keep your pets free of these pests.


Vital Information for R.E.S.C.U.E. Unit

The **R.E.S.C.U.E.** USB unit provides emergency service personnel with the information they will need to take the best possible care of our residents in emergency situations. The device is to be placed on the refrigerator, which is where EMS personnel will automatically look. The device will be plugged into a computer to immediately view vital information.

To receive a **R.E.S.C.U.E.** unit, residents can call Carol at the Village Hall (440) 786-2964 to make an appointment to come in to answer the medical and basic information questionnaire (see below). This information will be up-loaded onto the **R.E.S.C.U.E.** unit. Appointments will be made for either Tuesday or Thursday between the hours of 9am and 11am. Appointments usually take a half hour. All of the information provided will remain confidential and will not be sold. Each **R.E.S.C.U.E.** unit will also be protected by a passcode that needs to be entered to access the **R.E.S.C.U.E.** unit.

Residents will be asked to provide the following items/information that will be uploaded to the **R.E.S.C.U.E.** USB unit:

- Photo I.D.
- Medications
- Allergies
- Living Will (if you have one)
- Power of Attorney (if you have one)
- Next of Kin
- Contact Information
- Funeral Arrangements (if they have been made)
- Hold Harmless Agreement (after signed by resident)
- Hospital of preference
- Doctors' contact information
- Additional information you feel is important to have stored

Street Commissioner's Report

Trash Pickup will be delayed one day the week of May 24th because of the Memorial Day holiday. Trash and recyclables will be picked up on Saturday, May 30th that week.

Household Hazardous Waste Disposal Program will take place at the Service Center (6800 Dunham Road) **May 18th through May 22nd** from 8am to 3:30pm. Household hazardous wastes are materials that are marked dangerous, caustic or flammable. Only materials that originate from a household and not a commercial source will be accepted. Latex paint will not be accepted. It is comprised mostly of water and is not a hazardous material. To dispose of latex paint, solidify and place with your curbside trash.

Household Material Accepted

- Oil or solvent-based paint, sealers, primers, or coatings (aerosols or liquids)
- Varnishes, polyurethanes, shellacs
- Paint thinner, mineral spirits, turpentine
- Pesticides, herbicides, fungicides
- Caustic household cleaners
- Pool chemicals
- Automotive fluids, motor oil, car batteries
- Adhesives, roof tar, driveway sealer
- Kerosene, gasoline, lighter fluid
- Mercury, fluorescent bulbs (4 and 6 ft. length)

Materials NOT accepted

- Latex paint
- Explosives, gun powder, ammunition, flares
- Medical waste, pharmaceuticals, medicine, sharps
- Radioactive waste (i.e. smoke detectors)
- Tires
- Electronics, appliances
- Business waste
- Commercial waste
- Compact fluorescent lightbulbs — please recycle at Lowe's or Home Depot

Paper Shredding – Saturday, May 9th – 9am to 12pm

We will be offering a personal shredding service for our residents and businesses on Saturday, May 9th from 9am to 12pm. You will have the opportunity to dispose of old financial statements, tax forms, bills, medical records, and other paper without worrying about identity theft or the effect of dumping paper into the environment!

A powerful, mobile document destruction vehicle will provide quick, confidential destruction and recycling of your items to be shredded. Staples, binder clips and paper clips are acceptable. This program is only for Walton Hills residents and businesses; therefore proof of residency will be required. The shredder and bin will be located at the Village Hall parking lot off of Alexander Road. The program will proceed rain or shine.

We will shred: bank statements, books with hard covers, brochures, cancelled checks, computer printouts, copy paper, envelopes, financial reports, folders, hanging file folders, greeting cards, ledgers, letters, magazines, medical records, pamphlets, tax forms.

We will not shred: plastic bags, boxes, paper products contaminated with food, clothes.

A donation of \$5 for Walton Hills residents and \$10 for Walton Hills businesses would be appreciated. The money will be used to purchase items for our food pantry. You can also donate paper products (toilet paper, paper towels, napkins, and tissues), shampoo, toothpaste, soap or cleaning supplies.



But the best part of the luncheon was getting to know the men and women of our Police Department who look after the residents of this beautiful Country Home District we villagers call home. They served us and sat and ate amongst us during lunch. They brought along some of their "Tools of the Trade" and demonstrated their use. We learned about their personal lives and we shared about ours. We got to put a name to a face that day. That is what community is all about, getting to know your neighbors and all those men and women who work to keep this village up and running like clock work day in and day out.

I personally have completed both of these programs and I urge everyone to attend. You will find them exciting, interesting, and they may just save your life!

Spotlight on

Rita Charsanko

One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village

Rita Charsanko thinks Walton Hills is WONDERFUL! She has lived in our community for over half a century and has enjoyed a wonderful life. She was born at her home in Cleveland by a doctor who made house calls. She is a graduate of John Hay High School, which is located in the heart of University Circle. She acquired strong secretarial skills which came in handy because her first job after graduation was the secretary to the principal of John Hay. She held this position for five years.

Rita met her late husband Dick when they were children. Dick will be fondly remembered by longtime residents as "Doc," who served the Village as a councilman and Village dentist for several years. They were next door neighbors who attended kindergarten together. However; Dick was placed ahead one year and ended up going to East Tech High School. They reconnected a year or two after high school. Dick was studying to be a dentist and was attending dental school in Columbus. They were married in 1952 after the completion of his first year in school. They enjoyed living in a large house with five other families who all became great friends. During that time, Rita worked at Battelle Memorial Institute as the secretary of the Engineering and Physics Department.

When Dick graduated from dental school in 1955, they came back to Cleveland. She landed a job at the Cleveland Board of Education as the secretary to both the Deputy Superintendent and the Director of Kindergartens; she worked there for five years. She took a break from working to raise her two young children, Dave and Suzanne. When they got older, she went back to work at Stouffer Hotels and Resorts in Solon as the secretary to the Vice President of Design. She worked there for ten years until she retired. She really enjoyed the perks of that job,

especially staying at Stouffer hotels around the country for free. She particularly remembers a great time in Scottsdale, Arizona where her family stayed in a suite with their own kitchen and hot tub!

Rita and Dick built their home on Alexander Road in 1960. Dick's first dental office was on E. 112th and Miles. The barber up the street, the late Village resident Gus Vosgerichian, told him that an addition was being built to a building in Walton Hills at the corner of Alexander and Walton Road and they were looking for a dentist and a hairdresser. Dick needed a change; people were getting robbed in the parking lot of his dental office. He decided to check out the Walton Hills location and he and Rita were delighted with what they found. He moved his office to Walton Hills in 1957 and then searched for a place to build a home. Realtor General Conelly talked them into purchasing the property next door to his office, which is now the Villager Restaurant.

Rita's family is very important to her. She and Dick had a wonderful marriage which lasted for 51 years until he passed away in 2003. She lives with and is very close to her son Dave, who is very protective of his mother. Her daughter Suzanne lives in Canton, and Rita very much enjoys when her family, including her five

grandchildren, pay her a visit. Rita is also related to local celebrity John Adams. He is the son of her cousin and is the dedicated Cleveland Indians fan that has played his drum in the bleachers during nearly every Indians home game since 1973.

Rita attends St. Andrew Eastern Orthodox Church in Maple Heights. For the last 15 years she has made pierogis for her church every other week for nine months out of the year. She has also volunteered as a "Red Coat" at Playhouse Square for the last ten years, ushering three times a month. Rita is a member of the 50 Plus Club, the Women's Club, the Lake, and Carol's Bookworms. She served as secretary of the Women's Club for several terms.

Rita loves to read; she will read almost any newspaper, book or magazine. She also enjoys taking part in Village activities, such as the senior lunches. She is grateful that Walton Hills is a very congenial community that has so much to offer. She believes that the Lake is a great asset and is glad she has made wonderful friends and has great neighbors (According to Rita, Denny Linville is *the* greatest neighbor). All in all, Walton Hills has been a wonderful place to live for the last 55 years!
