Dear Neighbors and Friends,

February looks to be another promising month for Walton Hills as we have already passed our annual operating budget for 2016. The last few years, we have been very proactive in passing our budgets in December; we accomplish this two to three months in advance before any deadlines become an issue for our Village. We always propose a very conservative budget and review it as the year progresses. During the last five years, we have "lived" within our proposed budgets while making any necessary adjustments in December.

Most communities, including our Village in the past administration, only pass a small portion of their budget to last until the state mandated deadlines approach. When operating in this way, most communities realize that when the First Quarter passes, reducing community operations becomes much harder on everyone, including those who draft the budget and the employees of each community. When deadlines approach, communities often times become reliant on scrambling for tax increases or incurring more debt, or even reducing services.

All of this is now avoided by our Village because we propose a yearly budget. After the proposal, we review and discuss it and

then we "live" within the final budget that has been agreed upon. We have been very successful in this process. As our community continues to have an open line of communication with all of our businesses, we will continue to explore new possibilities to grow our Village. We can also find success when we invest in relationships with other communities. Walton Hills is moving in a positive direction!

An example of moving in a positive direction: our community has agreed to hire a new Law Solicitor for the Village of Walton Hills. With a unanimous vote of 6 to 0, we have all agreed to give William D. Mason a two year contract to provide our Village with the services of Law Solicitor. Mr. Mason served as our Prosecuting Attorney for Cuyahoga County from 1999 until 2012. He was also the Law Solicitor for the City of Parma from 1993-1999.

We have agreed that with all of the attention that was derived from the forming of the new Joint Economic Development District (J.E.D.D.) with Sagamore Hills Township, and the collaboration of the four communities and two counties involved in the Sagamore Road Project, our Village has gained a lot of attention. We have also gained a lot of recognition from many state and county officials as the place to watch for a large projection of growth in the next few years. We feel that we need to be prepared to address those issues as they move forward and we want to continue to build our future with strong relationships and great talent to benefit Walton Hills.

Please remember, we move forward as a team and then we win as a team. We have been blessed to have so many favorable circumstances to continue to be positive and focus on what is best for everyone; we will always look towards the long term growth of our community. May God Bless our Village!



Important Reminders for 2015 Annual Tax Return Filers

The Village is incorporating two major changes for 2015. First, it is requiring everyone to file, including retired individuals. Second, if an individual files a federal return, the first page of the 1040/1040A/1040EZ Form should accompany the local return whether the person is retired or not.

The main purpose for requiring a copy of the first page of the 1040 Form is to assure that what is being reported to the Federal government is being reported to the Village. The Village does have access to residents' federal filing information, but must utilize the City of Cleveland's Central Collection Agency to perform those duties.

The Village also wants to assure that it accounts for everyone living and residing in the Village and therefore is requiring everyone over 18 years of age to file. The Village has created a simple form for a retiree to sign and attach page one of their 1040 Form if one is filed. The form should only be signed if the retired or disabled individual did not work in 2015 and did not have or receive any of the following:

- W-2 earnings statement
- Any gambling or lottery winnings
- A shareholder/partnership distribution (Federal Form K-1)
- Any net profit business income
- Ownership of rental property

Outpatient Drug Coverage: Part B vs. Part D

Your prescription drug costs and coverage depend upon which part of Medicare covers your medication. Understanding which part of Medicare should cover your drugs will point you towards the Medicare rules you need to follow. You can get Medicare prescription drug coverage through a Part D stand-alone prescription drug plan or through a Medicare Advantage Plan that includes prescription drug coverage.

Part B Usually Covers:

- Drugs your provider administers.
- Drugs administered at a dialysis facility (that buys the drugs themselves).
- A small number of outpatient prescriptions you get from the pharmacy (mainly certain oral cancer drugs for chemotherapy).
- Certain vaccines (usually only flu, pneumonia, and Hepatitis B). Make sure the pharmacy accepts your Part B coverage. If you have a Medicare Advantage Plan, check their rules about flu shot coverage.
- If you are a hospital outpatient, Part B should cover all medications that relate to the reason for your hospital visit.
- Tip: You usually pay a 20% co-payment after meeting the Part B deductible. If you have a Medicare Advantage plan, different costs may apply. If you get your medications from a pharmacy, make sure the pharmacy accepts your coverage.

Part D Usually Covers:

- Most drugs you get from the pharmacy or through mail order (outpatient drugs).
- Most prescription drugs that you can administer yourself.
- Vaccines not covered under Part B, including the shingles vaccine.
- If you are a hospital outpatient, Part D will cover medications that you administer yourself and do not relate to the hospital visit.
- Tip: Make sure it is included in your plan's formulary, which is the list of drugs they cover, and use a preferred network pharmacy.
- Tip: You usually pay a co-payment for your medications, once you meet a deductible. The amounts vary based on your plan and how much you have spent on prescription drugs so far this calendar year.

Note: If you are an inpatient in a hospital or skilled nursing facility, your drugs are usually covered by Part A.

Spotlight on

Jane Nowicki

One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village

If you've visited the Walton Hills Village Hall through the years, you probably know Jane Nowicki. She has been a friendly face in Walton Hills, both living and working here, for many years. As Jane prepares for the next chapter of her life, retirement, we're going to take a look back at her past and ahead to her life after retirement.

Jane was born one minute before June, her identical twin sister, on January 26, 1956 at Mount Sinai Hospital in Cleveland. She took a little over a year off, did some volunteer work, and considered her options. On March 14, 1994, Jane began work with the Village of Walton

Hills as assistant to Mayor Edward L. Thellmann.

Jane and her husband of 33 years, Tom, have lived in Walton Hills since 1983.

June's boyfriend set Jane and Tom up on a blind date in 1978. Tom, however, had a pretty good idea what his date would look like! They went to a Journey concert that evening and have been together ever since. She remembers driving through the village with Tom and seeing a "For Sale" sign in front of a house on Egbert Road; that was on a Friday. 
