Dear Neighbors and Friends,

The Christmas season has come and gone, but we would like to reflect on the time of year when most of us are filled with the giving spirit and celebrate our faith, hope and love. The Village of Walton Hills demonstrated that spirit last month with the 14th annual Santa Delivery as we delivered gifts to 56 families in our community.

The giving spirit of Santa Claus wasn't just on display with the gifts he gave, but also with each emotional "Ho, Ho, Ho" and "God bless you, everyone" that he and his helpers echoed. As we went to each house, the expression of joy on the faces of the children, parents, grandparents, and in-laws was a pure blessing to see!

We need to recognize and give thanks to our recreation director and her helpers who organize this program each year. Our police and fire departments have the most important part, by providing safety with the use of their equipment. We would also like to thank our village council president along with another council member who rode on the back of the fire truck to help with the giving spirit which is appreciated by so many people.

The Santa Delivery program has provided memories to many families throughout its 14 year history. Walton Hills offers so many programs throughout the year from the senior lunches and the Parker Program to a working relationship with our Walton Hills Lake. What a blessed community we have! We could not enjoy any

of these wonderful experiences without the support of our council members, our Village employees and each of you, our residents.

We also have great programs to benefit our businesses. The Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) is one of the great programs we have in place that has benefited both our commercial and residential areas. On December 15th, Council voted to enter into a CRA agreement with NPK Construction Equipment on Independence Drive for a 50% tax abatement for ten years. NPK has made a substantial investment of approximately 4 million dollars to their existing footprint and brought more new jobs to our Village. The CRA program is a very powerful tool and option for our businesses that will help with more investment and redevelopment throughout our commercial area.

Many residents can also take advantage of the CRA program which will provide them with a tax abatement. The criterion is simple: a house must be at least 40 years old and the homeowner must make a major investment of \$10,000 or more to improve the value of the property. The homeowner is then entitled to apply for a 100% tax abatement of the new improvement for 15 years. An example: a homeowner who lives in a house built in 1975 puts an addition on his home for \$10,000. He is eligible to apply for the 100% tax abatement for 15 years. In addition, anyone who builds a new home on an address located in the residential district is eligible to apply for a 50% tax abatement for 15 years on the new construction. Please contact our Building Inspector, Rob Kalman, at 216.523.4445 for any information related to the residential CRA program. We will have this program running at full speed by the beginning of February 2016.

As we embrace 2016, let's have the same positive, blessed attitude we had to end 2015. Remember, by having that same positive attitude, we will have a fantastic New Year. May God Bless each of you!

As we begin a new year, we would like to share with you the top ten scams that affected several people in 2015, and what you can do to report the scams should you come across one in 2016.

Top 10 Scams of 2015

Internet Merchandise Scams

You purchase something online, but it is either never delivered, not what they claimed it was, or is defective.

Phishing/Spoofing Emails

Emails that pretend to be from a company, organization, or government agency but ask you to enter or confirm your personal information.

Fake Prizes, Sweepstakes, Free Gifts, Lottery Scams

You receive an email, regular mail, or a phone call claiming that you've won a prize, lottery or gift and you only have to pay a small fee to receive your prize.

Fake Check Payments

You sell something online and you're paid with phony checks and instructed to wire money back to the buyer.

Recovery/Refund Companies

A scammer contacts you and claims that you owe money on a debt or the scammer offers to recover money you may have lost in a previous scam.

Loans Scams/Credit Fixers

False promises of business or personal loans to repair your credit for a fee upfront.

Computer Performance Scams (Equipment and Software)

Scammers claim to offer technical support for computer problems and charge you a fee to fix nonexistent problems.

Scholarship, Student Loan and Financial Aid Scams

For a fee, a "research company" offers to conduct a customized search for scholarships or grants for students to

apply for. Scammers take the money and run or provide a worthless list.

Online Dating Scams

Fake profiles of scammers posing as attractive men and women, and then claiming they need money to help in an emergency, typically when they claim to be out of the country on a business trip.

Facebook Fake Friend Scam

When you receive a friend request on Facebook from someone you don't know or from someone you already thought was your friend. When you hit accept, you may have just friended a scammer.

This list was provided by Consumer Fraud Reporting, a free online service that warns consumers about specific scams. If you think you've ever been a victim of a scam, you could report it to the Consumer Fraud Reporting website, just log onto www.consumerfraudreporting.org for more information.

Fiscal Officer's Report

The Sagamore Road Rehabilitation and Water Main Replacement Project is essentially completed. This project was unique in the way that Mayor Kevin Hurst worked with three neighboring communities (Northfield, Valley View and Sagamore Township), two counties (Cuyahoga and Summit), the Cleveland Water Department and the Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC).

The total project cost was originally estimated at \$4,052,678 and had the Village assuming \$598,960 of the cost. The Village's portion ended up to be \$564,197. The total project savings will be approximately \$880,000. The Cleveland Water Department will receive a majority of

the savings due to the water line replacement part of the project. Cleveland Water Department took responsibility for 100% of the waterline cost and a portion of the road rehabilitation.

Savings on Village managed road and waterline projects should be of no surprise because just a few years earlier, the 2013 Egbert Road Rehabilitation and Water Main Replacement Project originally projected the Village paying over \$772,000 out of its own savings. The Village ended up only owing \$175,703.49 on a State of Ohio Loan payable over 30 years at a 0.00% interest rate.

Prior to the commencement of the project, the four municipalities received a grant and loan approval for \$449,999 towards the project. It is estimated that only \$124,075 of the originally estimated \$225,000 OPWC loan will be needed. The OPWC grant of \$224,999 was fully utilized. Originally, Cuyahoga County was not considered a funding source, but will contribute over \$21,000 for bridge repair.

The resourcefulness and careful management of the Village Administration and its engineering firm of Cuyahoga Valley Engineering, Ltd. can take credit for the full coordination of the project and its relating savings.

I hope you had a wonderful Christmas and enjoyed spending quality time with your family and friends. A new year is upon us and my wish for you is peace, health and happiness — and a winter that is sunny and mild (not like last year!). Whatever the weather, we will do our best to ensure the safety of all of our residents and those who pass through our community.

Christmas Tree Disposal

Live Christmas trees will be picked up by the Service Department beginning the first week of January, weather permitting. Any live Christmas trees can be brought out to the roadside with all decorations, wires, lights, etc. removed to prevent damage to the recycling equipment.

Trash Pickup Affected/Not Affected by Holidays

Trash is not collected on New Year's Day; therefore trash pickup will be delayed one day that week and the collection day will be Saturday, January 2nd. Although Monday, January 18th is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day and a federal holiday, it will not affect the trash collection. Trash will be picked up on Friday as usual that week.

FORTUNE COOKIE

I do not like the taste of fortune cookies because they're too sugary for my palate. But I, like everyone else, can't help opening up the wrapper and reading the little strip of paper hoping for not just good, but great news concerning our future. Most of the time when I open up a fortune cookie I find a Chinese proverb that makes no sense to me at all.

If I could slip a little strip of paper in a fortune cookie this is what it would say: From the womb to the tomb, in between is your life made up of changes. Every day something changes in our lives. How do we cope with these changes? Births, deaths, new jobs, new neighbors, health issues, the weather, financial problems, new spouses, a new school, breakups in relationships, the list goes on and on. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services has provided the New Year's breakdown of Medicare premiums, deductibles and cost-sharing amounts to assist you with understanding your benefits:

2016 Medicare Premiums, Deductibles and Cost-Sharing Amounts

Part A (Hospital Insurance)

Hospital Deductible	\$1,288/benefit period (renews when you're out of a hospital or Medicare facility for 60 days)
Hospital Co-payment	\$322/day for days 61-90 \$644/day for Lifetime Reserve Days
Skilled Nursing Facility Co-payment	\$161/day for days 21-100
Part A Premiums*	\$411/month for those with fewer than 30 quarters of Medicare-covered employment \$226/month for those with 30-39 quarters of Medicare-covered employment

*Most people with Medicare do not pay a monthly premium for Part A because they have (or a spouse has) 40 or more quarters of Medicare-covered employment (meaning they worked at a job where they paid into Medicare)



Part B (Medical Insurance)

Annual Deductible	\$166
Premium for those with incomes below \$85,000 if single, \$170,000 if married **	\$104.90/month \$121.80/month-New Medicare enrollees

**Part B income-related premium adjustment amounts for people with higher incomes. Also note, Medicare Advantage plans may charge an additional monthly premium.

Go Paperless and Get Your Medicare Summary Notices Electronically!

Now Medicare recipients can access their Medicare Summary Notices (MSNs) in a new and exciting way — electronic delivery! These are called electronic MSNs (eMSNs). By signing up to get eMSNs, you will access new eMSNs faster at MyMedicare.gov, (eMSNs are monthly and paper MSNs are quarterly), reduce your mail (no more paper copies to file) and help Medicare save money.

To sign up, visit MyMedicare.gov and select "Create an Account." Once you've signed up for your MyMedicare.gov account, complete the following steps:

1. Login to MyMedicare.gov
2. Select "My Account" from the menu
3. In the "User Information" tab, select "Email and Correspondence Settings"
4. In the "Electronic Medicare Summary Notices (eMSNs)" area, select "edit."
5. Select "Yes" and then "Submit" and you're done!

Medicare Hospice Benefit

Medicare will provide coverage for your hospice care if you have part A and meet **all of the following**:

- Your hospice doctor and your primary care physician (if you have one) certify that you're terminally ill (with a life expectancy of six months or less)
- You accept pain and symptom relief (palliative care) instead of care to cure your illness
- You sign a statement choosing hospice care instead of other Medicare-covered treatments for your terminal illness and related conditions
- You receive care from a Medicare-certified hospice agency

Once you begin receiving hospice benefits, you must create a plan of care with the hospice medical director and your loved ones or doctor.

Covered services: skilled nursing, durable medical equipment, nutrition and dietary counseling, skilled therapy, medical social services, prescription drugs for pain management and symptom control, pastoral care, aide and homemaker services, respite care.

Costs: When you elect the hospice benefit, original Medicare pays for all care related to your terminal condition, even if you have a Medicare Advantage Plan. Medicare pays in full for all the services described above, with some small exceptions:

- Prescriptions: **Inpatient** pain management and symptom control drugs are covered in full. For **outpatient** pain management and symptom control drugs, you pay no more than \$5 for each prescription filled.
- Respite care: When you need care by someone other than your caregiver (so your regular caregiver can rest), you pay five percent of the Medicare approved amount.



One of the many threads in the fabric of our Village

Some people make it their life's mission to serve others, and that is exactly what Charron Cox has done. From serving the community while working for the phone company, to helping patients decipher their medical bills and to donating to the victims of Hurricane Katrina, Charron just wants to help others.

Before we learn about her service in the community, let's learn a little bit more about Charron. She was born on December 23rd in Cleveland and raised in the Hough Neighborhood. Charron said that growing up in a diverse community, attending several schools, and being around the famous Harlem Globetrotters has helped shape the woman she is today. Charron's father was the traveling manager of the Globetrotters and she said, "We were always exposed to different cultures, different people. It was a really happy environment!" She is also very proud that her father played professional baseball in the Negro Leagues. He was with the Cleveland Buckeyes in 1945 when they won the Negro League World Series.

In school, Charron was in the Major Work Program, a gifted education program that gave her the opportunity to attend a variety of schools outside of the area and prepared her for the working world. After graduating from East High, she worked for the Ohio Bell Telephone Company which was owned by AT&T. It later became known as Ameritech, then SBC and is now AT&T again. Charron recalls telling her parents that she would only work at the phone company for 6 months, but she felt that it was such an exceptional place to work that she ended up staying there for 32 years before retiring from the company. However, after retirement she stayed with SBC for an additional five years doing consulting work. The telephone company paid for her college education. Charron attended the annex of Capitol University



located in Cleveland while she was still working at the telephone company. She graduated with honors and earned a degree in business management and communications.

Charron said she had several unique opportunities working in the telecommunications industry, including introducing the additional 888 toll-free services across the United States. The industry had to introduce 888 because they were running out of numbers. Charron received several awards for her work. Another unique memory from working at the phone company is that Charron remembers meeting John F. Kennedy Jr. on a plane to Martha's Vineyard. She was on her way to give a phone company presentation. Charron said he was so handsome, charming, polite and courteous!

Charron is currently working for the Cleveland Clinic in its customer service department. She helps patients understand their medical bills, which often times is confusing. Charron interacts with patients and explains to them what all of the terminology means. "I feel that I can help people and that makes me feel good." She continues, "Many people are sick, they don't understand their bills and it's frustrating for them. So, I enjoy this because I feel like I'm helping."

Charron spends a lot of time working in the community, but she doesn't forget about spending time with Joe, her husband of 43 years. She said Joe is a

wonderful person and she couldn't have asked for anyone better! They have one son, Joseph. Charron and Joe have lived in Walton Hills for 13 years. Charron feels that Walton Hills residents are wonderful, nice people who do a lot for others in need, which is right up her alley! She gave the example of when Hurricane Katrina happened and several of the victims from New Orleans were relocated to Ohio. Charron organized a donation drive along with residents and close friends Judy Annett and Maddie Timm, who took over 100 boxes of items to help the victims.

Charron has done a lot in the village. She was a member of the Southeast Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) for several years and she was the secretary and trustee of the Walton Hills Lake. Charron took part in the police department's first Senior Citizens' Academy. While riding along with an officer, she was in a high speed car chase! She recounts: "We came upon somebody, he told him to pull over and he didn't! We didn't catch him. He was going around 100 mph. You could hear me say, 'Oh my God! My husband is going to kill me if I get killed!'"

Even after her car chase experience, Charron said that she's been very blessed and very fortunate. She loves her church, Destiny, which is located in the Chamberlin Middle School in Twinsburg. The church is looking to purchase The Edge, a sporting complex, on Route 82. Why would the church buy a sporting complex? If you ask Charron, the answer is simple, "Our thought process is you can reach out to the young people that way. I love that. I love people, I always have loved people." So, if you're young or old or somewhere in-between, no matter your age, if you need help, Charron is only a phone call away. She would love to help you!
