Dear Neighbors and Friends,

We wanted to inform everyone that after 27 years of service, Police Sergeant Peter Kanjuka retired. He will be missed and the void will be hard to replace. With his retirement, our police force has 11 full-time patrol officers. We have one chief, one captain, three sergeants, and six deputy patrol officers. Along with the 11 full-time officers, we have seven part-time deputy patrol officers.

The number of full-time officers reached an all-time high of 16 in 2010. After some major budget reductions we were able to have 12 full-time officers in 2012 and started the path of employing part-time officers. This was accomplished through strong leadership as well as cooperation from the Village Council.

Because of Sergeant Kanjuka's retirement, we have been approached by the police department and their union to hire more full-time officers or promote part-time officers to full-time. This request was made for safety reasons; to have officers patrolling our Village more efficiently. It has been agreed upon to lower the hiring wage for full-time officers from \$33/hour to \$28/hour in order to hire (or promote) two more full-time patrol officers.

After discussing and reviewing the 2016 budget, we feel that we can start at this lower rate and save money over time and become more efficient in the operations of our police department.

Through April 30, 2016, Walton Hills' income tax collections are up overall by 2.05%, this equates to \$37,892 more than at this time last year. We are down in regards to individual and net profit revenues, however. This is due to income tax filings not hitting the bank by the end of April. We are up 23.08% in regards to payroll withholding which equates to well over \$250,000. This is due in large part to the JEDD, but also because of several business expansions and receiving payroll taxes that we were not anticipating.

Please make no mistake about this, and rest assured, that if we experience any type of downturn in our economy, then I, as the Chief Administrator, will be the first to recommend that we reduce our workforce and remove personnel as needed. We have already demonstrated this reduction in staffing and have no problem doing so again; in 2010 we had 48 full-time employees and now in 2016 we have 29 full-time employees in Walton Hills.



A Message from our Veterans' Liaison

The Ohio Flags of Honor traveling memorial will be making its way to our community in a few months. It honors the women and men who have given their lives in Afghanistan, Iraq and globally in the War on Terrorism. It began its journey in May of 2004 by Gino and Lisa Zimmer after they were notified that their son, Specialist Nicholas E. Zimmer, U.S. Army, had been killed in Iraq. The Zimmer Family received an overwhelming amount of support from different veterans' motorcycle clubs and organizations at Nick's funeral; they then established the Operation Iraqi Freedom Chopper Fund.

In September of 2005, Ohio was notified that the U.S. Marines from Lima Company 3rd Battalion/25th Regiment were returning from Iraq and they suffered heavy losses during the eight months they were in the Middle East. Sixteen of the twenty-two killed in action were Ohio Marines and the state wanted to honor Lima Company upon their return home. Members of a local American Legion Post made plans to set up an "Avenue of Flags" that the returning Marines could view as

they passed by. These "Flags of Honor" were to be flown in honor of their comrades who were not returning with them, along with dozens of "tribute" flags, sponsored by Ohio veteran organizations, displayed separately.

Shortly thereafter it became apparent that the Operation Iraqi Freedom Chopper Fund could have more impact by focusing on Ohio's fallen soldiers through the "Ohio Flags of Honor" memorial tribute. On October 15, 2005, the Ohio Flags of Honor Foundation officially started. The traveling display is a way communities can pay tribute to Ohio's fallen soldiers. The foundation aims to raise public awareness and support for Ohio's returning veterans throughout the year.

The Ohio Flags of Honor will be in Walton Hills Friday, November 11th through Sunday, November 13th. The Walton Hills Service Department has been very busy! Last month we installed a few new landscape beds at the Village Hall. Before Memorial Day, flags were hung all along Northfield Road, Alexander Road and portions of Walton Road, which only adds to the already "patriotic spirit" of our residents and leaders.

Some things to **LOOK** for this month as you travel through the Village: construction on the new waterline replacement on Dellwood Drive and McLellan Drive, newly planted trees in the median on Alexander Road, freshly painted interior and bathroom security doors under the pavilion at TG Young Park, the new flashing speed zone signs on Alexander and Sagamore Roads, and of course look for the additional flags this year added to the poles along our main corridor.

Some things to **WATCH OUT FOR:** our brush chipping crew working in the street, our grass cutting crew working along the roadside, work crews walking along the streets on litter cleanup detail, service department personnel and contractors working on repairs in various locations like parking lots at the Village Hall, Northfield Road, Dellwood Drive, McLellan Drive, Alexander Road and Dunham Road to name a few.



Scam Alert

A local senior sent the Better Business Bureau (BBB) a copy of a phony letter they received from the "Publisher's Clearing House" (PCH). The letter arrived on what appeared to be PCH's letterhead. It said: "**CONGRATULATIONS FINAL WINNER.**" The letter explained that the consumer won \$5 million and in order to claim their winnings, they must call their financial agent to have funds released within five days of the notification, otherwise all funds will be returned unclaimed and will be donated to charity.

The BBB and PCH suggest these tips before claiming any prize:

- PCH or any other legitimate sweepstakes will NEVER ask you to send money or prepaid debit cards to claim a prize, pay taxes, or fees. At PCH no payment is ever necessary.
- If you receive an email stating that you have won a major sweepstakes prize, but are asked to provide personal financial information, or send money to claim the prize — **STOP** — you have most likely been contacted by a fraudulent sweepstakes. PCH does not notify major prize winners by email.
- If you receive a check claiming to be from a legitimate sweepstakes and are asked to cash it and send a portion back — **STOP** — you are being scammed! The check is not real. You may be able to cash the check immediately, but it can take weeks for the check to bounce. Now you are stuck paying the fees for a faulty check.
- Contact PCH directly if you think you have become the victim of a scam or you can use the BBB Scam Tracker at www.bbb.org/scamtracker to learn more about different scams that are going around.
