Dear Neighbors and Friends,

I would like to address some questions and statements that were brought to my attention at February's town hall regarding the proposed property tax levy. My goal of writing this letter is to ensure that our residents have current, correct information regarding the operations of the Village of Walton Hills.

One resident made a statement referencing the Village's expenditures and the vehicle that I drive while working for our community. The truth is that Village Council votes on all expenditures. Money, purchases, anything related to the Village, must first be approved by your Council Members. As for the vehicle that I use, it is the same 2009 Ford that our previous Mayor drove. Also, in my office, you'll find the same furniture, filing cabinets and television used from the previous administration.

Now about that alleged Bedford City School levy. I, along with other Village leaders, checked with the Bedford City School District and the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections to find out if in fact a school levy will be on this November's ballot. Both entities confirmed: there is not going to be a school levy on the ballot in November 2017. You can always contact the Bedford City School District at info@bedford.k12.oh.us or by calling (440) 439-1500 to hear from them directly about those allegations. If you'd like to hear from someone at the Board of Elections, you can call (216) 443-VOTE (8683).

I would also like to clear the air: I have no malice or anger towards our Village's past Mayor and administration. I only reference that time in our Village's history to use those past operations as a point of reference for our current operations. During the previous administration, a lot of money was wasted. Our Village experienced \$1.8 million in deficit for two years back to back in 2008 and 2009. That was the largest in our Village's history and we had the largest number of employees in

the history of our community during Mayor Anielski's administration. I would like to extend an invitation to anyone who would like to view our financial records, to make an appointment to come to the Village Hall to view the hard copies of our financial documents and masterplan. Remember, the figures recorded in those documents do not lie.

I understand that since I have been the Mayor of Walton Hills, I have been misunderstood by some people and accused of verbally attacking a few of our residents. I would like to publicly apologize and offer my humble services to anyone who may feel that I've offended them. It is not my goal to make anyone feel uncomfortable. I became Mayor to serve everyone and because I love our Village and I want the best for all of us, now and in the future.

Please take into account that when we, the Mayor and Village Council, have reached out to our state representative we have gotten no response or assistance of any kind. We've reached out multiple times, but continue to be ignored. During the last six years, we've tried to set up times where both sides could meet to have an open conversation about the state of Walton Hills. No meetings have come to fruition, and it's not due to our lack of trying. My question to you is, what else can we do to make our residents understand that we've put forth an honest and concerted effort to ask, request and/or receive support from our state representative, but haven't received any response from her directly?

If our current administration in Walton Hills has been doing something wrong, don't you think it's our state representative's responsibility to hold us accountable? She hasn't had to because we've done everything in our abilities to operate Walton Hills above reproach. We've reached out to get answers from our state representative, but our questions remain unanswered.

Property Tax Levy Proposal

Tuesday, May 2nd

As most everyone knows, the Village of Walton Hills will be proposing a 5.0 mill increase next month. The proposed levy will be up for vote on Tuesday, May 2nd. If it passes, it will help support our current police operations. The money raised from the levy would go towards the police department's operations and the money originally budgeted for the police operations would then be allocated to other areas of Walton Hills. Several residents and business owners have questions regarding the proposal. Our goal is to answer them so you can make an informed decision next month.

What is the proposed levy for and how much will Walton Hills receive?

Our 5.0 mil levy proposal is to support police operations. By offsetting costs in the police department, all departments in the Village's operations will benefit. The Village will get to keep 100% of the money raised through the levy. We estimate that the increase would generate around \$699,247. Of this, \$341,222 would be from the residents, \$179,471 would be from businesses and \$220,508 would come from the public utilities.

Why not just raise the income tax?

Walton Hills has one of the highest

local income tax amounts of 2.5%. Increasing the millage would be a fair distribution of taxing amongst residents, businesses and public utilities located in the Village.

Does Walton Hills have any levies? No. The Village only has 0.3 mill, which has been the same since 1951.

Is this a permanent levy? No. This levy has a four year term. In order to renew, it would have to be voted in by our residents. Council also has the option to rescind the levy at any time.

Why hasn't the Ford Plant site and the Arhaus Furniture site been redeveloped or sold yet? Both facilities have garnered a lot of interest. Ford still owns the property and is actively removing machinery. We are in constant contact with them in this process and they are progressing at a much quicker rate than they have in other plant closures. The Arhaus property is also in negotiations.

Why did Walton Hills purchase the former Sacred Heart of Jesus Church? The Village was approached by church leaders to purchase the facility for less than market value. This was a rare opportunity to increase our footprint, which has been a part of the Village's

masterplan. The Village issued new debt for the property, and we plan to repay over time as you would a mortgage. There is a large banquet facility that we will rent out which can help offset our yearly costs.

Please attend the town hall on Wednesday, April 19th at 6pm at the recreation center located at 14660 Alexander Road to ask any questions you may have. Arrive at 5pm for the open house of the facility.

Spring has rolled in and folks have rolled out their motorcycles. With that in mind, Motorcycle Ohio reminds riders to "Ride SMART." Motorcycle Ohio, part of the Ohio Department of Public Safety's Office of Criminal Justice Services, leads the Ride **SMART** campaign, which urges riders to: Ride **S**ober. Ride **M**otorcycle Endorsed. Ride **A**lert. Use the **R**ight Gear. And Ride **T**rained.

Ride Sober: In 2015, 288 motorcycle crashes involved an impaired driver. Operating a motorcycle requires an enhanced level of focus, coordination and balance, so compromising skills by riding impaired can be dangerous.

Ride Motorcycle Endorsed: After passing a motorcycle knowledge test, new riders can visit the BMV to get a motorcycle temporary instruction permit identification card (TIPIC). There are restrictions with the TIPIC, and they're valid for one year. You can get more information at any BMV location in Ohio to learn more about getting a TIPIC.

Ride Alert: Riders need to be paying attention to what they are doing and what other vehicles around them are doing. Riding a motorcycle is more tiring than driving a car and riders need to be aware of their surroundings.

Use the Right Gear: Proper gear is essential for safe riding.



Wearing the right clothing makes riding more enjoyable and more comfortable. It's important to wear a Department of Transportation compliant helmet and other protective gear like eye protection, proper clothing and hearing protection.

Ride Trained: Part of being a motorcyclist is about lifelong learning. Getting started with training through Motorcycle Ohio gives riders a solid foundation. Learn how to ride a motorcycle or refresh your motorcycle safety skills. Register for a \$50 course, scheduled around the state from March through November at motorcycle.ohio.gov.

Crime Prevention Tips for Senior Citizens While Taking a Stroll

Crime and the fear of crime create special problems for the elderly. Crime prevention is everyone's responsibility, not just a job for law enforcement. Seniors can learn how to protect themselves from crime while out taking a walk by following these simple suggestions:

- If you are attacked on the street, make as much noise as possible by calling for help. Don't pursue your attacker. Call 911 and report the crime as soon as possible.
- Avoid walking alone at night. Try to have a friend accompany you, even during the daytime.
- Always plan your route and stay alert to your surroundings.
- Walk confidently.
- Stay away from buildings and doorways; walk in well-lit areas.
- Have your key ready when approaching your front door.
- Don't dangle your purse away from your body. Twelve percent of all crimes against the elderly are purse snatchings and street robberies. Carry only what you need. Better yet, sew a small pocket inside your jacket or coat. If you don't have a purse, no one will try to snatch it!

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"Can You Hear Me?" Calls Reported in Ohio

The Ohio Attorney General's Office is warning Ohioans about suspicious calls where callers are asking "Can you hear me?" Similar calls have been reported throughout the country as part of an alleged scam to trick consumers into responding "Yes" and using their response to place unauthorized charges on their phone or utility bill. "Any time people receive a call that's suspicious, we encourage them to be very careful and not to respond to the call," Attorney General Mike DeWine said. "When in doubt, just hang up. If you need help or if you suspect a scam, contact the Ohio Attorney General's Office."

Consumers say the calls appear to come from a local phone number, such as a number showing a 614 (Columbus) or 330 (Akron) area code. They also say the scam-callers claim the consumer has won a vacation or cruise or claim to work for an extended warranty company. Tips to avoid potential phone scams include:

- Don't respond to suspicious calls. Let them go to voicemail, or just hang up if a call seems questionable, especially if it's an automated telemarketing call, which is used commonly in scams. If you receive a "robocall," hang up immediately.
- Don't always trust caller ID. Even when calls appear to come from an Ohio phone number, the numbers could be spoofed or the calls could be made over the internet, meaning the caller could be located somewhere else entirely.
- Check your phone bill and your credit card statements regularly. If you find suspicious charges, report them to your provider immediately.
- Consumers who suspect a scam or who want help resolving a consumer problem should contact the **Ohio Attorney General's Office at (800) 282-0515 or online at OhioProtects.org**.
- You can also report your experience to the Federal Trade Commission online or by calling (888) 382-1222.

It's vital that everyone be aware of possible scams and know how to respond to them, so as not to be taken advantage. The more you know, the better off you'll be. If someone contacts you with an offer that sounds too good to refuse, look for the following **red flags**:



1. If you're asked to send a small amount of money to win big money.
2. If they offer to send you money and you're told to keep some for yourself and send the rest elsewhere.
3. If you're asked to wire money to someone you don't know.
4. If you're asked to use a Green Dot card to pay for something or someone you don't know.
5. If you're asked to send a gift card for payment.
6. If you're asked to provide personal information over the phone and you didn't initiate the call.
7. If you're asked to not talk to others and/or to act quickly.
8. If they want you to donate money, but refuse to send you information in the mail first.

Before sending money or sharing personal information, always consult with a family member, trusted friend or the police department first. You can also request for your phone number to be added to the "Do Not Call Registry." To register by telephone, call (800) 382-1222 or TTY (866) 290-4236. You must call from the phone number that you want to register. To register online (donotcall.gov), you will have to respond to a confirmation email.

Remember, if you are suspicious about a phone call then disconnect the call immediately and contact the respective company directly.



SIX YEARS OF ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Let me define the word “we” as it pertains to the Village of Walton Hills’ accomplishments over the last six years. “We” includes the Mayor, Council, employees and residents. All four entities have worked together to put our community on the 2016 Crain’s List as one of the most progressive communities in Cuyahoga County. One of the reasons the Village made that list is the Joint Economic Development District (JEDD) which Mayor Hurst created with Sagamore Hills which increased our coffers by \$387,607 in 2016. Here are some of the other additions/changes that have occurred in the Village during the last six years:

Police and Fire Departments: An ambulance is located on our property 24/7/365 in the new annex building which allows for quicker response times for the fire/rescue service to Walton Hills’ residents. There are around 400 fire and rescue calls a year in the Village at no cost to residents. A portion of the basement at Village Hall has been remodeled into living quarters for the Oakwood Fire Department’s rescue workers. Mayor’s Court fees have increased which will allow Walton Hills to purchase a new police vehicle each year. Auxiliary Officers conduct house watches while residents are out of town, they assist at different community events and conduct traffic control when needed. The Walton Hills Police Department is a regional dispatch center as it dispatches for Walton Hills, Oakwood Village and fire/rescue for Glenwillow. In 2016, the revenue source for the dispatch center brought in \$137,957 to Walton Hills. The department also holds Senior Citizen Police Academies and one of the department’s sergeants is a certified R.A.D. (Rape Aggression Defense) Instructor. R.A.D. is a women-only self-defense course teaching realistic tactics and techniques to provide women the tools needed to prevent or escape harmful situations. The safety services in Walton Hills is priority one to make sure residents feel safe in our community.

Recreation and Community Life Department: Here are some of the upgrades done to improve the Recreation and Community Life Department in Walton Hills: a new concession stand was built at TG Young Park including upgrades to the bathrooms to meet standards of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA). There’s a new radio controlled car racetrack and the baseball diamonds have also been upgraded. A new vehicle was purchased to make it more comfortable for residents who have to be taken to



their doctor’s appointments and to go shopping. The Village hired a social worker to help senior citizens navigate their retirement years. Some programs have extended across our border to include residents from Oakwood Village. Other programs have improved during the last six years including, but not limited to, Community Day, Memorial & Veterans Day observances, the National Day of Prayer, the Parker Program & baseball, senior lunches, adult trips, Morning Meetings with the Mayor, States of the Village and town halls. Our Recreation and Community Life Department continues to expand and provide fun for all ages in and around Walton Hills!

Service Department: Here are some of the improvements made in regards to the Walton Hills Service Department: Sagamore Road has been resurfaced which was a joint venture with other communities. New street signs with larger letters and more reflectivity have been added to improve safety along with the flashing stop and speed limit signs. There’s a new digital sign in front of the Village Hall which provides up-to-date Village information. The gateways have been upgraded with lights and fences for beautification.

The corners of Alexander Road and Northfield Road have new landscaping. There are lighted trees lining the divider on Alexander Road next to the Ford Stamping Plant. Flower baskets are on the bridge crossing Tinker’s Creek. The rubbish and recycling containers, along with the collection, are no cost to residents. The recent purchase and ongoing remodeling of the former Sacred Heart of Jesus Church to benefit our residents and residents of other communities

as well. The site is 5.6 acres, 12,000 square feet, it includes the church building that houses a banquet hall which seats 300 guests, and it has a large full kitchen complete with dishes, tables and chairs, the sanctuary, eight garages and a house. Remodeling and landscaping of the property is being done by our service department. The service department, which is second to none, continues to do road repairs, landscaping, lawn cutting, leaf pickup, chipping, snowplowing, building maintenance, and assisting with the recycling roundups held throughout the year.

Village Hall: Improvements in and around the Village Hall include: resurfacing and striping the parking lots, improvements to the Community Room which include painting, a new kitchen counter, appliances, cabinets, flooring and electrical work. Cabinets have been built in the Community Room to benefit the historical society. There are new bookshelves in the library and new furniture as well. New LED lighting has been installed in the Village Hall buildings. The Council Chambers has been upgraded with new chairs and plaques. There are a couple of benches with landscaping at the drop off point in the upper parking lot. Red, white and blue lights illuminate our buildings at nighttime. American and military flags are proudly displayed along Alexander Road and Northfield Road. The mailboxes (including the white Village box) and recycling bins have been moved in the upper lot for easier and better access to all that use them.

Property Tax Proposal: At the current millage rate, the Village only receives approximately \$13 a year from you. The rest of your money goes to the schools, Cuyahoga County, the Metroparks, the port, and the library. Currently, with a home in Walton Hills valued at \$145,100, the homeowner pays \$3,116.30 in property taxes. Here is the breakdown of where that money goes:

So how do we fund the services and improvements that go on in our community? Through municipal income tax which is withholding and net profits from individuals and businesses that are located in the Village and by individuals who work in our Village. Mayor's Court, grants and miscellaneous government programs, licenses, fees and permits generate the rest of our revenue.

The Village has a great future, it's just going to take time for all of the pieces to fall into place. In the meantime, I hope you will support the proposed police levy next month. It is for four years and at any time during the four years, Council can rescind it. Mayor Hurst and Village Council are in agreement: the levy is needed. It will continue to keep our community safe and secure and our residents will continue to enjoy the amenities that the Village has to offer. I would be remiss if I did not mention the Mayor and my fellow Council Members. We may not always agree on issues, but we work together to find a solution that is best for our residents and our community.

I am proud to serve with these individuals who continue to put their time and talent to work to make our community a great place to live. Remember, Council could have passed a levy with a swipe of a pen, but we didn't want to do that. We wanted your input. You are a part of what makes this Village a place where people want to work, live and raise their families. Please attend the Town Hall on Wednesday April 19th at 6pm at the new recreation center. Village leaders will answer any questions that you may have regarding this issue.

Street Commissioner's Report

Now that spring has arrived, we can put away our winter equipment and start to gear up for our warmer weather activities. Brush chipping begins Monday, April 10th. The free program was originally started as a way of providing a convenient service for our residents to help maintain their wooded lots without the need to hire a contractor after stormy weather. We strive to run the chipper up and down each street in the Village on a weekly basis from April to October.

The program's value is in the idea that we will chip in front of every house at least once a week. If a yard project is larger than what the homeowner can do themselves and a contractor does need to be hired, the yard debris must be completely disposed of by the hired contractor according to Village ordinances. This process keeps it fair for everyone. April is also the month when we start to see our landscape islands come alive, the American and Ohio flags are flying all around town, baseball field work is going on and some street repairs are in progress.

It's time once again for residents to sign up for the senior citizen and



handicapped resident lawn care program. You must be 65 or older or have a handicap which prevents you from cutting the lawn, have earned income of less than \$10,000 and have no other person residing with you who is capable of providing lawn care service. Lawn cutting season is from approximately April 15th to October 31st. Head over to the Village's website, or contact the Village Hall at (440) 232-7800 to get application information and prices. Full season

and first installment payments are due Monday, April 10th. Finally, the household hazardous waste disposal will be held at the service garage Monday, April 24th through Friday, April 28th, 8am-3:30pm each day. Although we'll be a little shorthanded this season compared to last season due to our reduced staff, we are still committed to providing all residents with top notch service.


