Dear Residents,

Your voice was heard after the police levy election on May 2<sup>nd</sup>. Although the levy failed, it is the responsibility of our Village leaders to move forward and stay focused on our goal of keeping the Village of Walton Hills economically sound. For record keeping purposes, I would like to remind residents that there were several opportunities for you to learn the facts about the levy and the long term goals of the Village. We had four town hall meetings to discuss the proposed levy and to answer any questions you may have had regarding the levy and the operations of the Village of Walton Hills. The attendance at each of the first three meetings was around 110 residents. The last town hall coincided with the open house of the Walton Hills Community Center; approximately 256 people attended the last event.

It was the goal of the Village leaders to make sure you were informed about the goings-on of Walton Hills before casting your vote; we want all residents to feel that they understand the truths about how the Village of Walton Hills operates. I've mentioned it before, we are a transparent administration, aiming to keep residents in the loop of what's going on in our community. We have been transparent for the last six years, and will continue to be transparent now and in the future. We have made reductions throughout the Village's operations during the last six years to sustain our Village; we have also made improvements and investments with the goal of increasing our footprint.

Because of recent events, we will re-evaluate all of the factors of our operations and make

adjustments that will sustain our community for the long run. Residents will be informed of any major changes in the Village in the upcoming issues of the Walton Hills Journal. There are several options on the table, and they are simply options, that will be presented to the Village Council this month and voted on for approval shortly thereafter. Listed below are some of the proposals and possibilities that will be discussed and under consideration for the Council's approval:

- Some long-term employees will be removed from our operations; all full-time and part-time police employees will be considered for the possibility of layoffs and reduction in hours of operations
- Dividing the house, garage, and the one acre lot from the community center to possibly sell
- Allowing the Village administration to package and promote the 16 acre parcel located on Walton Road directly across from Jefferson Drive to possibly sell; we will also discuss the possibility of selling all vacant lots owned by Walton Hills
- Allow zoning changes to commercial development around the Village to potentially generate more revenue
- Discuss selling the Village's old service garage on Krick Road
- Reducing each department by 10% to 15% by the end of 2017
- Having all employees pay 20% of their health insurance instead of the 10% that they currently pay

## Legislation Approved at the 5.16.2017 Council Meeting

Council meeting minutes are available in their entirety on the Village website

**Ordinance No. 2017-9** approves the editing and inclusion of certain ordinances as parts of the various component codes of the Codified Ordinances; providing for the adoption and publication of new matter in the updated and revised Codified Ordinances; repealing ordinances and resolutions in conflict.

**Resolution No. 2017-13** repeals Resolution No. 2016-28 which adopted a 12 month moratorium on the granting of building permits or certificates of occupancy for the cultivation, processing, and retail sale of medical marijuana in the Village of Walton Hills.

# Mayor's Letter

- Reducing all full-time administration and service department employees to 7 hours - 5 days a week to make all work weeks 35 hours instead of 40 hours
- Lockout services that the police department provides will be eliminated
- The animal warden service that is provided to residents will be eliminated
- House-checks will be limited by our auxiliary officers
- All tow release fees and criminal fines will be increased to follow suit with our surrounding communities
- Possibly suspend our Walton Hills detective services and instead use an outside contract and/or use the Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Department for that service, which could prolong all Walton Hills' investigations
- We could research the possibility of having the Cuyahoga County Sheriff's Office policing our Village
- Residents would pay a \$200 fee for ambulance services, beginning in August 2017
- Possibly increasing all fees associated with the Recreation and Community Life Department's programs
- Community Day expenses could be drastically reduced like not having fireworks and having less vendors
- Residents will pay for rubbish pickup at a cost of \$17 per month
- Raise the inside millage for 2018 by 2 mills
- Canceling the Walton Hills lake Contract for 2017
- Possibly reducing the number of Journals published

yearly, reducing the number of pages in the Journal, or completely stopping the production of the publication altogether for the time being

Again, these are simply considerations that will be discussed at this month's C.O.W. and Council Meetings to improve the economic outlook for the Village of Walton Hills. Residents are encouraged to attend those meetings, as they are public. Again, we will have an update on any decisions in the upcoming issues of the Walton Hills Journal.

# Insurance Inventory

While most of us realize how important insurance is in our daily lives, we rarely spend the time to evaluate our insurance needs. Here are some recommended steps to conduct an insurance inventory.

## Homeowners/Renters Insurance:

Conduct a home inventory and make sure your homeowners or renters policy is up to date. Take photos or videos of your possessions. Remember to note prized items and their value so you can discuss proper coverage. You can utilize various apps to simplify the process or you can download a paper inventory checklist at: [www.insurance.ohio.gov](http://www.insurance.ohio.gov).

## Auto Insurance:

Review your liability insurance to make sure you have adequate coverage for any potential suits. Assess your deductibles for comprehensive and collision coverage. You'll pay those amounts if your car is damaged or totaled without fault of another driver. Adjustments can affect your premium. Keep a copy of your insurance card and your agent and/or insurer's contact information in your vehicle.

## Health Insurance:

Make sure you have your current insurance card. Verify that your paperwork is in order before seeing a doctor. If your insurance has a specified network, check that your doctors are still covered by your policy. In-network and out-of-network providers can change annually. Know your copays to avoid surprises. Before traveling, check to identify urgent care



centers and hospitals that accept your insurance coverage. Understand any applicable copays and deductibles your plan might have.

## Life Insurance:

Life changes should trigger a life insurance review. Any significant life changes may warrant a modification in your life insurance. It could change things such as coverage limits, premiums and beneficiaries. You may want to learn about options such as conversion privileges and use of death benefit, prior to death. Do not forget to verify that you have identified the desired person(s) as your beneficiary. As this may change due to life circumstances, it is advisable to review this periodically.

## Why conduct an Insurance Inventory?

Conducting an insurance inventory may be valuable from a financial perspective, as you could be able to adjust costs or do some competitive

shopping. Additionally, it is advisable from a coverage perspective. It is important to know what you have, what you need and to coordinate the two in the area of insurance coverage. Being an informed consumer can make all the difference.

## Points to Remember

When shopping for insurance be cautious not to become a victim of fraud. Do not give out personal information such as your social security number or bank account data, until you have verified the legitimacy of the insurer and the agent. Finding and working with a trusted advisor is highly recommended. This enables you to get the correct answers.

# Street Commissioner's Report

Hopefully the rainy season is behind us and we'll see more sunshine in June, July and August! Better weather will allow the service department to perform some of our duties in a timelier manner. A lot of our work is affected by the weather. It doesn't take much to throw our weekly plans out the window; rain, strong winds and stormy conditions often delay planned projects, sometimes for several weeks. Although we have now put additional controls on all budgeted expenditures due to last month's levy failure, we are still committed to continuing to provide meaningful maintenance to all areas of the Village. As of this writing, we are planning to continue to offer the brush chipping service that many of our residents rely on. Our hope is to be able to continue this program throughout the summer along with all of the other street and right-of-way maintenance duties, but with a greater attention to the cost of each assignment and service program.

I am aware that many residents had questions regarding the length of time it took to complete our brush chipping service in May. Several issues contributed to the delayed door-to-door service. The late seasonal wind storm followed by a heavy spring snow storm did quite a bit of tree damage throughout the Village. In the course of residents cutting up downed trees and cleaning up broken branches, brush piles became larger and more plentiful as the weeks went on therefore reducing the number of houses per truckload of wood chips, thus slowing the whole process down. As the weather cleared, most homeowners and landscape contractors created another brush pile immediately after we just chipped a pile, creating a back log at the vast number of homes. Brush piles that were tightly packed had to be pulled apart just to be able to feed the branches into the chipper, which slowed down the process further.

Rainy weekdays last month were a cause for concern as the wet weather makes it more dangerous along the roads. Our 15 year old brush chipper also had several breakdowns causing some delays. Hopefully we will be able to keep the machine operating as needed, and hopefully the weather cooperates so we can get back to our objective of getting through town once a week at each brush pile.

Other important guidelines to follow: place all cut ends of branches facing the pavement, spread piles out along your front yard rather than stacking in tight piles and do not cut up each long branch into too many small pieces, the longer the better. Also remember we cannot chip logs and branches that are greater than 8" in diameter and less than 4 feet in length. By following these simple guidelines we can hopefully get back to our weekly brush chipping program as it was intended.

## JUNE — Give Dad a Break

- Brown-yellow dormant grass is normal during summer's heat. If you require a green lawn during this time water deeply, 1 inch of water two times a week.
- Relieve lawn stress by applying gentle, slow fertilizers like compost, compost tea or sea kelp. Synthetic, chemical, high-nutrient fertilizers create stress on lawns.

- Read the weeds for a healthy lawn. Every weed tells a story and gives clues about lawn conditions. Learn to identify weeds and react accordingly.

### Did You Know?

Dandelions are not native to North America. Early European colonists brought dandelions over as a source of food and medicine. Dandelion greens are highly nutritious: containing more Vitamin A, K, Calcium and Iron than broccoli per 1 cup serving.




# SHOCKWAVE OF AUTOMATION

Bill Gates of Microsoft fame has a proposal, "The robot that takes your job should pay taxes," meaning that governments should tax companies' use of them, as a way to at least temporarily slow the spread of automation and to fund other types of employment (Source: Quartz Media LLC). - telemarketers - 99%
- tax preparers - 98.7%
- timing device assemblers and adjusters - 98.5%
- loan officers - 98.4%
- tellers - 98.3%
- umpires and referees - 98.3%
- procurement clerks - 98%
- packaging and filling-machine operators and tenders - 98%
- milling and planning machine setters, operators and tenders - 97.9%
- credit analysts - 97.9%
- drivers - 97.8%
- fashion models - 97.6%
- legal secretaries - 97.6%
- bookkeepers - 97.6%
- cashiers - 97.1%
- grinding and polishing workers - 97%
- restaurant cooks - 96.3%
- jewelers and precious stone and metal workers - 95.5%

- postal service workers - 95.4%
- electrical and electronic equipment assemblers - 95.1%.

In case you are thinking about changing jobs, here are some to consider in the future: robotics engineer, software developer, technician, sales engineer, operators and, last but not least, robotics account manager. It's impossible to really predict what work will look like in the future. Henry Ford is probably spinning in his grave with all that is going on with robots in the auto industry! As for me, I probably won't be around to see it, but it will be exciting I'm sure, change always is.
