Dear Neighbors and Friends,

As we start the month of March, I am pleased to report many positive changes that have taken place in our Village's operations. With the support of a majority of our council members, we are moving forward with the installation of the traffic cameras. We have also received permission from the council to apply for several grants that will benefit our community far into the future. The grants will allow for improvements to be made to T.G. Young Park (applied for in December of 2017) and for a 20-80% split for the purchase of a new senior/disabled bus with a wheelchair lift. We've also applied for a new recycling grant to help pay for advertising and support the shredding program we offer each year. We are currently looking at a Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council (NOPEC) grant to integrate LED lighting for many of the facilities owned by the Village of Walton Hills.

As we work throughout March to project and estimate our Village's collections, we are prudently keeping in mind our goal of pursuing a balanced budget for 2018 and of meeting our deadline for passing a final budget that will fund continued operations. In terms of the economic development taking place in Walton Hills, we are planning for many improvements in our business sector. Working with investors, acknowledging all of the incentive opportunities and coordinating the best solution are all factors that affect the eventual plan for development. As the plans unfold, we will provide you with the information in our monthly updates.

We recently received positive news regarding a building that has been vacant since 2015 located at 7300 Northfield Road. This building was a major safety hazard in 2015. The Oakwood Village Fire Department took action to close it down and the owner filed for bankruptcy. In the spring of 2017, we helped with an incentive to find investors to improve the building, bring it up

to code and make it safe for operation. Recently, a new business relocated from out of state to the building located at 7300 Northfield Road. The new company, MasTec, specializes in engineering and construction for electrical transmissions, oil and natural gas pipelines, renewable energy and wireless networks. We are excited that MasTec chose Walton Hills for its re-location and it will bring about employment opportunities and increased revenue for our community.

Furthermore, our Village has another exciting opportunity for growth: a trucking company plans to construct a new building located at 7560 Northfield Road. Like MasTec, it will increase employment, and the building will change the landscape of the Northfield Road Corridor.

We also have another business that is attempting to purchase vacant land in Walton Hills and is being handled through our established Community Improvement Corporation (C.I.C.). We installed C.I.C. as an economic tool for growth, and we are pleased that the organization is working to implement strategic planning and preparation that will benefit our Village. As the saying goes, the best way to predict the future is to create it. As we have demonstrated over the last seven years, we have many options to grow our community and sustain Walton Hills for years to come, as long as we maintain a positive attitude towards these endeavors as they take shape.

We will start implementing trash collection fees in April for all of our residents, though the cost still has to be confirmed by the Village's council. Once the cost is determined, residents will receive the first billing statement for 2018 as a quarterly billing. Please understand this is nothing new and was discussed at town hall meetings in 2017 after the levy failed.

# Walton Hills Police Department Information

The popularity of mobile devices has had some unintended and sometimes deadly consequences. An alarming number of traffic crashes are linked to driving while distracted, resulting in injury and sometimes death.

- More than 8 people are killed and 1,161 are injured daily in incidents reported as distraction-affected crashes in the United States
- In 2015, there were 3,477 people killed and an estimated 391,000 people injured in crashes involving distracted drivers
- At any given daylight moment across America, around 660,000 drivers are using cell phones or manipulating electronic devices while driving
- In 2015, one national survey reported that handheld cell phone use continued to be highest amongst 16-24 year old drivers

If you're under the age of 18 in Ohio, it's illegal to use any electronic wireless communications devices while driving. This means you can't do any of the following:

- Texting or emailing
- Talking on the phone, Bluetooth, Bluetooth speakers or similar devices
- Using laptops, tablets or computers
- Playing video games
- Using a GPS unless it's voice-operated or hands-free

If you're a novice driver, officers can pull you over if they see you doing any of the above. For adult drivers in Ohio, it's illegal to use handheld wireless electronic communications devices to write, send or read text messages while driving. Adult drivers in the Buckeye State are allowed to use cell phones for emergency communications and voice-operated or hands-free devices. Ohio's anti-texting law for adults is considered a secondary law. This means an officer must have another reason to pull an adult driver over other than texting. Ohio's cell phone



and texting ban for novice driver's is a primary law – an officer can pull a novice driver over for cell phone use or texting without having to witness any other violation, such as weaving or speeding.

If you receive a citation for use of mobile telephone while driving in Walton Hills it could cost you \$175. There are a few ordinances in Walton Hills to help prevent the usage of mobile devices while driving:

1. **432.435 - USE OF MOBILE TELEPHONE WHILE DRIVING**
2. **432.46 - TEXTING WHILE DRIVING PROHIBITED**
3. **432.47 - USE OF ELECTRONIC WIRELESS COMMUNICATION DEVICES BY MINORS OR PROBATIONARY DRIVERS WHILE DRIVING PROHIBITED**

# Medicare Prescription Protection

The phone rings and the person on the other end of the line says, "Hello, I'm calling from Medicare. We need to update our records." Seems simple enough right? Wrong. It could be a scam. Never give out personal information to an unsolicited caller. The person on the other end of the line could be working to steal your identity – your personal information. By doing so, they might be able to get medication through your plan and sell it illegally. This can be a source of big income for these identity thieves. For you, it can be a source of big problems.

Now that you know they are out there, what can you do to protect yourself? Here are a few suggestions you may want to follow:

1. Review the Explanation of Benefits (EOB) statement that you receive in the mail from Medicare. You should carefully look at all the items identified on your EOB. Are there any medications or other services that you are unable to identify as yours? If so, dig deeper. When you see an unidentified charge, report it immediately. Each month that a prescription is filled, Medicare will mail you an EOB. Review these as soon as possible so you can report a discrepancy and action can be taken.
2. Hide or lock up your medications in your home. This is especially true if you have strangers coming through your home, such as during a house sale. Just think how easy it would be for someone who came upon your medication to take a picture of it. With the information on the label, they could readily reorder your medications. Since they might not even take the bottle, it would not be missing and you would suspect nothing.
3. Whenever medical information or the labels on pill bottles is not needed...SHRED IT! Remember, the labels might have personal information such as your name and birth date, sometimes even your address. Do not make it easy for a thief to do their job.
4. It is your job to safeguard your personal information and written prescriptions. Never share this information with someone you do not know. It should only be shared with your physician, pharmacist or a trusted advisor.

# Street Commissioner's Report

The Village of Walton Hills' Service Department has worked tirelessly during the winter season to keep our streets safe. I'm pleased to report that despite the wide spread "road salt shortage" seen throughout much of Northeast Ohio's communities, our service department has been able to maintain the Village's roads in a manner that our residents and commuters are used to. Our service department crew continues to work diligently to maintain safe, passable roads.

Mark your calendars. The service department is teaming up once again with the Cuyahoga County Solid Waste District for recycling roundups.

## Old Computers

**Monday, April 23<sup>rd</sup> through Friday, April 27<sup>th</sup> • 8am-3:30pm**

If you have old computers or other electronics (no televisions) that need recycled, no problem. You can bring them to the service department on Dunham Road next month. Some electronic equipment contains valuable metals that can be recovered through recycling. You can bring desktops, towers, laptops, monitors, keyboards and peripherals, printers, modems, tablets, e-readers, telecom devices, networking equipment, cables, cell phones and video game systems to the service garage beginning at 8am each day.

## Household Hazardous Waste

**Monday, May 7<sup>th</sup> through Friday, May 11<sup>th</sup> • 8am-3:30pm**

Walton Hills will have a special collection of household hazardous waste during Monday, May 7<sup>th</sup> through Friday, May 11<sup>th</sup> from 8am – 3:30pm, daily at the service garage. Examples of household hazardous waste include: oil-based paint, solvents, used motor oil, automotive fluids, aerosols, lawn and garden products, pesticides, pool chemicals and household cleaners.

**One other quick note to pass along to residents - branch chipping will begin Monday, April 23<sup>rd</sup>.**

**MARCH**

**Spring Mower Maintenance Checklist**

- Sharpen mower blades
- Check filters and replace if necessary
- Clean spark plugs and replace if necessary
- Clean the deck
- Set the blades at 3 or 4 inches

**MOWING MARCH MADNESS**

- Get your lawn mower ready for the busy season ahead.
- Every 3 years, soil test in spring (or late fall) to determine what nutrients need to be added to the soil. Testing saves money, time and prevents over application of nutrients. Kits can be found at local Soil and Water Conservation District or Cooperative Extension offices.
- Lightly rake the lawn to remove compacted grass and snow mold caused by excess moisture.
- Start a compost pile with the first grass clippings of the season. Subsequent clippings should be left on the lawn as nature's fertilizer.

**DID YOU KNOW?** Studies show mowing your lawn to a height of 4 inches prevents crabgrass as effectively as a chemical herbicide.
